

LOCAL NEWS

ACCIDENT.—Philip Basterache, while felling a tree in the woods at Black River, Wellington, was accidentally struck by the butt of the falling tree and had his leg broken. It was set by Dr. King of Buctouche.

HOUSE BURNED.—The house of Malcolm McPhail, situated on McPhail's point about three miles from Buctouche, was burned to the ground last Thursday. It is said the building has been kept continuously insured for fifteen years until a few weeks ago, when the policy was allowed to lapse.

CUT HIS THROAT.—John Daigle, of Acadiaville, formerly of St. Louis, received word that his son, Ben, had committed suicide on Sunday of last week by cutting his throat in the woods of Maine. He had been insane for some days, and the men with whom he worked were awaiting a chance to send him home. On Sunday morning he was found behind the camp dead with his throat cut. The remains were sent to Acadiaville for burial. He leaves a wife and six children.

EQUITY COURT.—The case of A. C. Storer vs. G. W. Robertson came before the court at St. John last Thursday on a motion of Mr. Phinney to confirm the agreement for a settlement entered into by the litigants. It was decreed that the partnership be dissolved; that the partnership assets be vested in the defendant Geo. Robertson; that the receiver deliver up to the defendant, Robertson, all the partnership assets and property in his possession; that defendant pay all the partnership debts; that defendant give security for so doing; and that defendant pay plaintiff \$1,000 on demand and pay Samuel L. Storer \$1,600 the amount of his claim against Storer & Robertson, forthwith. Mr. Sayre and C. A. Palmer, Q. C., for plaintiff and Mr. Phinney for defendant.

PROBATE COURT.—At a sitting of the Probate Court before Judge James at Richibucto Thursday, two applications were made in the matter of the estate of the late John J. Thompson.

The first was an application to compel Margaret E. Thompson administratrix with the will annexed to deliver up to the court for cancellation the letter of administration formerly granted to her.

Order granted. Another application was made by George Lawson, of Lancaster, St. John, for letters of administration.

Ordered, That said Margaret E. Thompson be given ten days to file a bond and apply for administration, otherwise administration to be granted to the said George Lawson as prayed for. C. A. Danforth proctor for petitioner; Wm. D. Carter for heirs and next of kin.

ANOTHER OLD INHABITANT GONE.—Mr. Nathaniel Hutchinson, one of the oldest, and best known inhabitants of the county, died at his home in Kingston, last Friday. Deceased was born in Kingston, seventy-three years ago, in the house in which he died. He afterwards removed to Richibucto and then to Buctouche, but finally he returned to the old homestead. He was in the employ of several of the old business firms of this town beginning with Holderness & Chilton in 1848. Subsequently he was foreman with the late W. S. Caie in his lumbering and shipping business. He was a most genial man, and was warmly esteemed by all who knew him. He leaves a widow, three married and one unmarried daughter and a son, now in Tacoma. His remains were buried in the Kingston Presbyterian ground, Sunday. He was a brother of R. Hutchinson, barrister, of this town.

A FORMER KINGSTON LADY'S LUCK.—Mr. John C. Hannay, who removed from St. Nicholas River to California in 1891, has sent to friends in this county a late number of the Stockton (Cal.) Independent containing the following report of the probate of the will of Uriah Martin, of that city:—

"The last will and testament of Uriah Martin, deceased, was filed for probate yesterday by W. B. Nutter, attorney for Eugene M. Grunsky, the executor named in the document. The deceased was a farmer for many years, living near French Camp from away back in the fifties until a few years ago, when he removed to Stockton. He left an estate consisting of real and personal property worth about \$40,000.

The will was executed March 8, 1892, and was witnessed by M. D. Eaton, and W. B. Nutter. The bequests are as follows: To a niece, Elizabeth Robbins, residing in England, \$500; to a nephew, George Martin, residing in England, \$500; to a brother, George Martin, of Newfoundland, \$500; to the son of deceased, Thomas F. Martin, of Stockton, \$1000; to Josephine Powell, of Stockton, \$50 and no more. All the rest, residue and remainder of the estate is bequeathed to the widow, Elizabeth Martin, absolutely and forever. In the event of the death of either of the devisees the sum or sums which would be distributed to the deceased shall go to the widow."

The Elizabeth Martin mentioned is Mr. Hannay's mother, and is a native of Kingston. She taught school in Jardineville about forty years ago, when she was known as Miss Betsy Richardson. Her sister, Mrs. Wm. Brittain, still resides in Kingston. Her many old friends in this county will be pleased to hear of her good fortune.

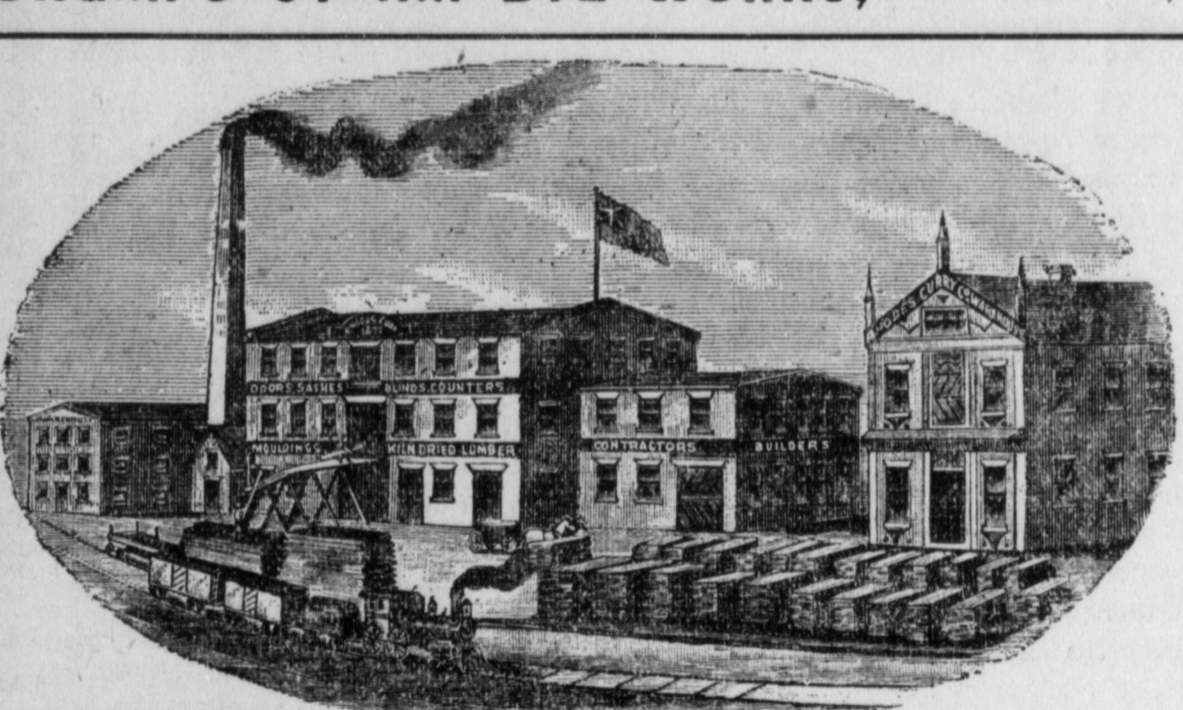
