Parliament.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 23.—The long drawn out budget debate came to a close tonight by agreement.

Hon. Mr. Laurier began soon after eight speaking to a full house and packed galleries. He took almost communistic ground at the outset, denouncing taxation as an outrage on human liberty and advocating the exemption of the great farming community from all contribution to the revenue and in ringing tones denounced the National Policy as burdensome to the consumers and only beneficial to a limited number of manufacturers. Taking the recent presidential election in the United States as a test, he went on to argue that the Great American nation had dealt a death blow to a system of protection that had sapped the life blood of the masses for 28 years and that the farmers of Canada would render a like verdict at the next general election. He ridiculed the idea of a government that believed in the N. P. being able to reform the tariff, or to produce any tariff measure that would meet the demands of the people on the question of reciprocity. He took the ground that as England had long ago admitted Canada's right to discriminate against the mother country, we were free to make the best terms possible in our own interests.

Hon. Mr. Foster's reply to Laurier, which lasted over two hours, was in his best vein, and aroused the enthusiasm of the party to the highest pitch. It was the speech of a statesman, a scholar and a man of the world. Mr. Foster was never more aggressive than he was tonight and he carried the war into Africa with instant effect sweeping away the sophistries with which the opposition had veiled their position and pointing out with unmistakable clearness that the issue was free trade versus protection. He warned the conservatives against being deceived into believing that the question was an unimportant one, and asked them to show by their votes that they were opposed to entrusting the revision of the tariff to a party that would make Canada a dependency of the United States. He proved by extracts from the records that Great Britain had never consented, in fact had never been asked to permit Canada in negotiating a reciprocity treaty to discriminate against the manufacturers of the old land, and reached Charlton and Davies most effectually on this point, to the delight of the house and gallery.

Mills of Bothwell followed Foster about midnight and spoke for some time in his customary philosophic strain.

Metcalf next took the floor. OTTAWA, March 1.—The budget debate closed at 2.40 when the vote was taken, the government having a majority of 54. The result was received with loud cheers. McCarthy and Col. O'Brien did not vote with the opposition.

OTTAWA, March 1.—This being private members' day, the House discussed a great variety of subjects. Dr. Weldon of Albert called for all correspondence relating to the disallowance of the Nova Scotia Mining act, last year, including the petition of McKeen, M. P. for Cape Breton.

Langelier moved a resolution setting forth the desirability of admitting raw and refined sugars duty free.

Cartwright took a hand in the debate and denounced Kenny, Stairs, Senator Drummond and others as the pampered pets of the Government, and as men growing rich by stealing the people's money. The debate stopped at six o'clock without a vote being reached.

After recess the House rejected Weldon's bill to disfranchise voters taking bribes after a short debate, 30 to 33.

Mulock's resolution to put binder twine on the free list was debated at great length during the evening session, and was finally voted down 91 to 51, McCarthy voting with the opposition. Pope's free corn resolution was also rejected 90 to 50. Colter, liberal, voted against the resolution and Temple, conservative, in its favor.

OTTAWA, March 2.—The greater portion of this afternoon's session was taken up in discussing the manner in which our coasting trade and trade with the West Indies and South America is handicapped by vexatious regulations.

Mr. Wood, of Westmorland, showed that the regulations requiring certified masters and mates, bore especially severe upon our ports, it being often almost impossible to secure them when wanted, although equally efficient officers not holding certificates were near at hand.

This evening Weldon of Albert in a lengthy address urged the disallowance of the Nova Scotia legislation handing over the mines to an American monopoly.

Kenny, of Halifax, defended the act and McKay, of Hamilton, supported Weldon's position.

Sir John Thompson took the ground that Nova Scotia was within her right in passing this legislation and that it was a matter in which the Federal authorities could not possibly interfere. The matter then dropped.

After speeches by McNeill, Fraser and Sir Donald Smith the house went into supply, passed an item or two and adjourned at 12.15 this morning.

OTTAWA, March 3.—This is a quiet day in the House, the chief business on hand being the consideration of the government bill to compel persons accused of criminal offences to give evidence under

oath. An amendment was adopted exempting the wife or husband of the accused person from disclosing conversations had with each other. The measure was discussed till six o'clock and then stood over.

The evening session was supposed to be given up to supply but it was 10.15 before the estimates were reached in consequence of a general attack on the industrial statistics given in the census.

Hon. Mr. Foster explained that while the practice of 1871 of not making public the names of manufacturers and other personal information had not been followed by the present Government, they had no objection to answering any questions in this direction put by members of the House. The House adjourned at 12.20 till Monday.

Valuable to Travellers.

Anybody can measure, approximately, the breadth of a river without a surveyor's compass or any mechanical means whatever. 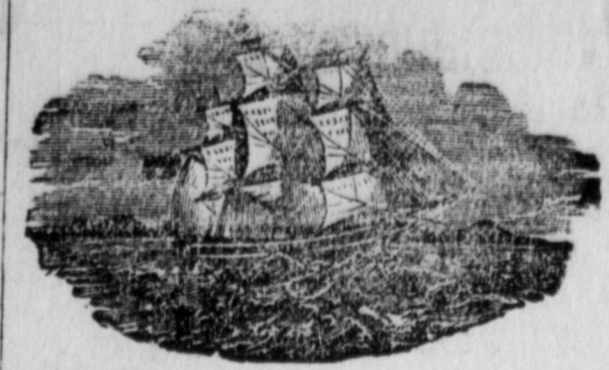
