## Why Lost People Walk in Circles.

The fact that people lost on a desert or in a forest invariably walk in a circle is due to slight inequality in the length of the legs. Careful measurements of a series of skeletons have shown that only ten per cent had the lower limbs equal in length, thirty-five per cent had the right limb longer than the left, while in fifty-five per cent the left leg was the longer. The result of one limb being longer than the other will naturally be that a person will unconsciously take a longer step with the longer limb, and consequently will tend to the right or to the left, according as the left or right is the longer, unless the tendency to deviation is corrected by the eye.

The left leg being more frequently the longer, as evidenced by measurement of the skeleton, the inclination should take place more frequently to the right than to the left, and this conclusion is quite borne out by observations made on a number of persons when walking blindfolded. Further, on measurement of the arms, it is found that in seventy-two per cent the right arm is longer than the left; while in twenty-four per cent the left arm is the longer, showing that a considerable majority of persons are right handed and left legged. The inequality in the length of the limb is not confined to any particular sex or race, but seems to be universal in all respects.—Ex.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 21.—Mr. Butler, of Iowa, introduced in the House to-day a bill to establish a truer figure of American constitutional liberty. It provides that, after July 4 next, the goddess of liberty shall be represented by a young woman of full stature, with mature development and proportion, wearing high laced boots, reaching midway between the ankle and the knee; hose reaching to the thigh; short skirts reaching downward to a point just above the knee; close-fitting bodice and sleeves to the elbow; and a cap moulded from a blue pansy bud. She is to bear for arms, at her left hip, in place and lightly suspended over her right shoulder, a pen with a holder extended, and on her breast, instead of a shield, an American ballot in black and white.


