The joy at finding him alive was too much for the woman, and she fell in a swoon from which he never rallied.

#### Wants Arms Engrafted

TACOMA, Wash. May 12. - Thos. Lee, a news stand proprietor in this city, has gone to Chicago and New York to submit to treatment by surgeons in the hope of having arms grafted on to his stumps. His arms were blown off by the explosion of a shell at West Point, N. Y., during the war, and with artificial one- and various contrivanceshe has managed to run his business here. He has had an uphill time of it to make a living. Many persons are inclined to joke about Lee's mission, but Dr. McCutcheon, who counselled with the armless man, says there is very good prospect that he will have his arms extended on the same plan that flesh is grafted from one person to another. ### To Embarrass Gladstone.

DUBLIN, May 10 .- The police guarded all night the Four Courts in which a bomb was exploded at 10,40 o'clock Saturday evening. The walls of the court building were little injured. Saturday half the city has been in the neighborhood. The purpose of the persons throwing the bomb was not to sacrifice human life, for at night the neighborhood is deserted. The Nationalists believe that the thrower of the bomb intended to embarrass the government. The police attribute the act to an Unionist agent, who wished to make the impression that the Irish extremists were eager to remind the people of the Phœnix Park assassinations.

### Lizzie Borden's Trial.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., May 10.-Lizzie A. Borden was brought from the Taunton jail Monday afternoon and arraigned in he Superior Court on three indictments of two counts each. Two of them charged her with the murder of Andrew J. Borden and Abbie Durfee Borden separately, and the third charged her with the murder of both. At the end of each indictment the Clerk asked : "Lizzie Andrew Borden, what say you to these indictments, are you guilty or not guilty ?" To each she answered clearly, calmly and then adjourned.

I'wo distinct cyclones, a terrific hail storm and a waterspout combined to wreak awful destruction in the newly built towns in Oklahoma on Tuesday night of last week. An accident by which twenty persons lost their lives is reported from the province of Saragossa, Spain. A religious procession was crossing on pontoons over the Gallego river. The pontoon collapsed under the weight of the pr cession, and a large number of people were plunged into the water. Twenty perished in the river and scores were rescued in an exhausted

Thus far this season 15,000 immigrants have been landed at Halifax, of which over 6000 were ticketed to points in Canada. This return compares very favorably with the showing for the same period of last year. The movement from the United States is also gratifying. From all the border States in the Union delegates have been sent to inspect land in the North-West. There is, besides, a big influx of American farmers. The Interior department is advised that ninety-one homestead entries were recently made by a party from Schuyler County, Nebraska.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 10.-The Opera House in New Westminster was packed last night to hear the speeches of Premier Davie and others in reference to the existing dissatisfaction on the mainland over the failure of the government to bring down a redistribution bill and its action in voting \$600,000 for the purpose of erecting government buildings at Victoria. Mr. Davie was not accorded a very steadily, "I am not guilty." The Court flattering reception. He defended the course of his government in reference to distribution by saying that on the census returns, as forwarded by the government at Ottawa, it was impossible to bring down now a new bill amending the distribution of seats.
