To the Farmers of Kent:

GENTLEMEN,—We all feel and regret the vicissitudes and changes in the horse market within the last few years, and are fully convinced that the common plugs that could be sold a short time ago for the horse cars in the several cities are not now wanted for that purpose; but as fine carriage and saddle horses still command remunerative prices it is therefore to our interests to breed our choice mares to such horses only as will guarantee a fair prospect of that result. In our endeavor to accomplish this it is very essential to keep before our minds the truism "that like begets like, or the likeness of some ancestor." It then naturally follows that the horse to breed to should of himself have all the requirements necessary, together with the other qualifications of pedigree back of him. I am led to address you on this subject as there appears to be some misapprehension in regard to the pedigree of some of the many horses held for service in this county. Some say sneeringly, "Oh! 'Tis an easy matter to frame a pedigree." To this I may say that a person manufacturing a false pedigree for a horse and then taking money for the services of the same is receiving money under false pretences, and the penalty of this crime is very serious.

Not long ago a card was extensively distributed, signed by one J. A. Simpson, which read as follows, viz: "The finely bred trotting stallion Apollo, sired by Aurora, dam, Dr. Lewis' celebrated blood mare. Apollo stands 16½ hands high. Weight 1050 lbs. Can show a 2:50 clip, and walks without urging 6 miles an hour," etc.

As J. A. Simpson was not generally known in the county, and the horse's "walking without urging 6 miles an hour," while his excessive height for a horse of his weight seemed rather phenomenal, some sober minds got doubting; but it appears that confiding, innocent C. C. Carlyle accepted J. A. Simpson's pedigree and raised "a prize colt." Had one of our matter-of-fact farmers accepted this unreasonable walking phenomenon of J. A. Simpson he would deserve to be laughed at, but when such a simple, confiding child-like person as C. C. C., who apparently believes anything and everything in print, adopts it our sympathies are enlisted. So sanguine is C. C. C. that J. A. Simpson states facts in his card, that a very short time ago, in writing about his "prize colt," he states "Apollo is a perfectly developed horse; he stands 16½ hands high," and knocks the socks off Simpson by saying "he weighs 1300 lbs., that his dam is the celebrated Lewis' mare, one of the finest thoroughbred blood mares ever seen in the lower provinces, etc." It is a pity such a wonderful myth could not be materialized, as then we would more than likely have several "prize colts."

There yet remains in the county a horse named Apollo, and as his owners are known to be honorable men, no doubt they will take the earliest opportunity to disabuse the minds of any who may confound the imaginary horse of Simpson and C. C. C. with him.

In reply to a letter, Dr. Lewis writes as follows, viz: "I beg leave to say that the reports of this man Simpson so far as relates to my having owned a mare which raised a stallion by Aurora, are not correct and without truth, as I never owned any such animal."

Gentlemen, farmers, there is a great deal in pedigree when not based on imagination.

Restigouche Notes.

The remains of one of the three young men who were drowned last fall when on a shooting excursion in a canoe, were found on the shore at Escuminac, nearly opposite Dalhousie, about eight miles from the place where the unfortunate young men were supposed to have been drowned. They were so disfigured that identification could only be made by the clothes, which showed them to be those of Mr. J. Miller. The remains were removed to Newcastle to be interred in the family burying ground.

Paul Devereaux, Esq., J. P., Black Point, cut his knee slightly about four months ago. He paid little attention to the cut at the time. The wound was chilled, and soon showed alarming symptoms. On the advice of his medical attendant he was removed to the hospital in Campbellton. After prolonged suffering his health began to give way, he gradually grew weaker, and expired on Friday last. His remains were removed the same day to Black Point.

The degree of Dr. of Medicine was conferred on Mr. John McNichol, New Mills, by the Medical Faculty of Philadelphia, on the 4th inst. Dr. McNichol immediately on receiving his degree was appointed by the Faculty one of the surgeons of the hospital connected with the Institution, which shows the appreciation they have of his ability.

With the exception of a few days the weather has been extremely cold and dry. The rivers are consequently very low. The snow is nearly all gone in the woods. If heavy rains do not come soon it is apprehended that many drives of logs will be hung up.

Abundance of herring are being caught on both sides of the Bay. The salmon fishermen have their nets all ready, and will set them in a few days.

Some of the landings of logs on the tributaries of the Restigouche gave way a few days ago while the ice was running, and before the boom at the rafting ground could be put in order most of them drifted to sea. Men in boats caught some of the logs as they were passing Campbellton. It is considered that the loss will be heavy.

Goldleaf is the son of Rysdyk, 653, Sire of Clingstone, 214, Victor, 214, Geo. M. Rysdyk, 225, Maud A., 226, Bertrac, 227, Dam, Oakleaf, by Sunshine, (thoroughbred.) He is bay in color, with two hind ankles white. He stands 16 hands high and weighs 1100 pounds. He is perfectly sound, and has an excellent set of feet and legs, with plenty of bone and substance, good back and loin, well muscled and springy ribbed, splendid head and neck, well put on, oblique shoulders, and deep chest, and a fine main and tail. His finish style and action are perfect, and though never handled for speed, he shows a natural and frictionless gait, and will go fast if developed. He can now show a 2:40 clip. He has good stiff action, and opens up wide when he moves.

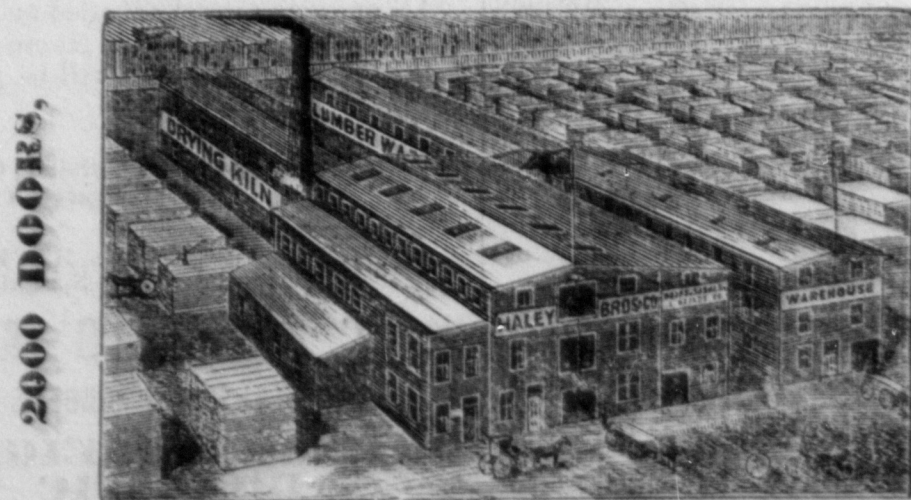
