Behring Sea Fisherman.

PORT TOWNSEND, W. N., May 12.—Advice from Sitka, Alaska, state that Attorney General Olney has ordered District Attorney Johnson to abandon the prosecution of the British schooner Henrietta, charged with receiving a cargo of seal skins in Alaska waters last summer without reporting to the customs authorities. The vessel was seized in the Behring Sea and sent to Sitka for trial. The case was similar in all respects to the seizure of the British steamer Cogitaban by the United States revenue cutter Corwin last June with 1,000 seal skins removed from British schooner in Alaska waters. Attorney Johnson was ordered to deliver the Henrietta to the British authorities on demand.

A Call to Arms.

Mrs. Champness, in a recent number of the *Joyful News*, has a spirited article on the Local Veto Bill, entitled "The Beer-sellers' Battle Cry," in which the writer sends forth the following "call to arms":—"Fight," says Lord Burton at St. James' Hall. "Fight for your hearths and homes, for your wives, for your children! Fight!" A noble battle cry, indeed! England's liberties have been won by it in times gone by! Shall England's people be enslaved by it now? Those who fought, fought for Britain's freedom, have made the hearth and home, the wife and child, to be the lawful right of every Englishman; shall the watchword, so dear, so pure, so holy, be interpreted in these enlightened days to mean the sanctity of the sanded bar-parlour, the beauty of the bedchamber landlady, and the well-fed child of the publican? Are there no other hearths, and homes? What of the thousands of ruined households, the millions of broken hearts, the squadrons of squalid, starving children, that cry to us from city and hamlet alike? "Alas, for what we might have been but for the drink!" Lord Burton did not know the English people when he so lightly sent forth that battle call. From every sober home, from every praying heart, from every indignant breast, where manliness and brotherliness hold sway, let the voice of Christian conscience, awakened truly, go forth in a mighty responding shout, "We will fight!" We will, in the name of the Lord of Hosts, fight for the helpless weak, the drink-driven, in whose path the ever open door of the beer-house lies as he staggers to his ruined home, into whose nostrils comes the reek of the fatal liquor that has been his downfall; for the little child, whose shoeless feet early learn the way to the gates of hell through the "swinging portals of the gin palace;" for the wife whose ruin is all too sure, as she sits by her drink-desolate hearth drowning her dread sorrow in the drink for which she has lost all that once made her lovely! Aye, and for our own bonnie sons and daughters, still free from, but always exposed to, the temptations of an unlimited freedom in this accursed trade; for hearths as yet safe, for homes as yet inviolate, as well as for the sorrowful and sickening woes of our enslaved fellow men. Fight Englishmen, fight! This Direct Veto Bill has already drawn forth the sincere and clearly expressed hatred of "The Trade," which has let us know its opinion of proposed restriction. This should be at once an encouragement and a warning to the men who long for England's freedom from the chains of a dangerous and destructive traffic; and it should also stir up every true Temperance worker to heroic deeds, worthy of the grand war-cry, so sadly prostituted by the drink-seller at the mass meeting of his kind; but so intrinsically glorious as to be fit for a nation's clarion call to purity, freedom, and sobriety. Fight! for your hearths and home; for your wives and little children!"

Startling Confession.

DENISON, Tex., May 6.—Sensational developments occurred yesterday in the Carlisle-Luttrell murder case at Sherman. Late in the evening the news became current that Geo. Hogg had written to Judge Brown for particulars in Charles Luttrell's case, as a pardon had been applied for, and he wished to thoroughly investigate the case.

The pardon had been applied for because of information given by Luttrell concerning the terrible butchery of women here last spring.

The exact confession cannot be had. Through a high official it is learned that Charles Luttrell stated that since 1878 Jas. Brown, John Carlisle and friends had killed 248 men in order to kill testimony against them in a murder case.

Luttrell's startling confession is but a glimpse of the awful reality of this unparalleled series of crimes that cost 248 men their lives and perpetrators millions of dollars.

Luttrell would not give the names of the victims, and said he did not know all, but they would be forthcoming in every instance of the killing by his gang. Every eye-witness was shadowed and killed sooner or later, and all strong circumstantial witnesses were killed by hired murderers and the officers dared not interfere if they regarded their lives. Luttrell is fast weaving a death web around Carlisle and others heretofore unsuspected, while he is bettering his chance for clemency if not for liberty.


