

LOCAL NEWS.

NEW POSTMASTER.—Mr Melem Daigle has been appointed postmaster at Aldouane, Kent County.

DISSOLUTION.—A suit has been begun by A. C. Storer in the supreme court in equity for a dissolution of the partnership existing between him and Geo. W. Robertson, H. H. James, referee in equity, has been appointed receiver.

THE ROADS.—The roads during the past week have been excellent. Between Richibucto and Buctouche they were as smooth as if they had been rolled. Travelling between here and Kingston has been chiefly on the ice which is in excellent condition.

SMELTS.—The thaw last Monday put a stop for a time to the smelt trade, which continued brisk through all the cold weather. One buyer—Mr. Andrew Loggie—paid out over \$1000 in one day last week for smelts. Last Saturday, George W. Robertson paid out over \$800.

RECEIVED HIS REWARD.—Peter O. Carrol, of Pictou, has received his reward of five hundred dollars offered by the local government for the capture of "Jim," "Buck's" companion, less fifty retained by the government for Thompson and Steeves, who gave information leading to the arrest.—Times

THE MONCTON AND P. E. ISLAND RAILWAY CO.—The Moncton and P. E. Island railway company gives notice that it will seek power to increase its capital to a million, and issue bonds to the extent of a million and a half; also to empower the company to build its railway from the junction with the Buctouche and Moncton railway to Richibucto Cape.

RACING AT KINGSTON.—A very large crowd gathered on the ice above Kingston bridge last Tuesday afternoon to see the race between Mr. H. M. Ferguson's pony "Jack" and Dr. Ferguson's pony. The race was for a purse, the amount of which has not been announced. The ice was in excellent condition and the day being fine not a few ladies were on hand to witness the race. Mile heats, best three out of five, each of the owners to drive his own pony, was the agreement. Messrs. S. A. Girvan, Richard Hebert and Robert Law were the judges, and Mr. T. F. Curran, starter. "Jack" won easily in two heats.

THE COST OF BUCK AND JIM'S TRIAL.—The council meeting at Dorchester on Tuesday next will have to deal with an expenditure of almost \$3,000 incurred in the trial of Buck and Jim, and the execution of the former. This large tax on the people has largely grown out of the failure of the city government of Moncton to suppress such illicit dens as the Donnelly house in that city. Mrs. Donnelly is in jail in Dorchester serving out a sentence of three months—a punishment which has little or no deterrent effect on people determined to keep such dens open, and those in authority who are willing to aid them.—Sackville Post.

ANOTHER KENT COUNTY MAN ABROAD.—We clip the following from the Asotin, State of Washington, Sentinel:—Hon. Wm. Farrish, member elect from this representative district to the Third Legislature of this state, is favorably mentioned in connection with the candidacy for the speakership of the next house. 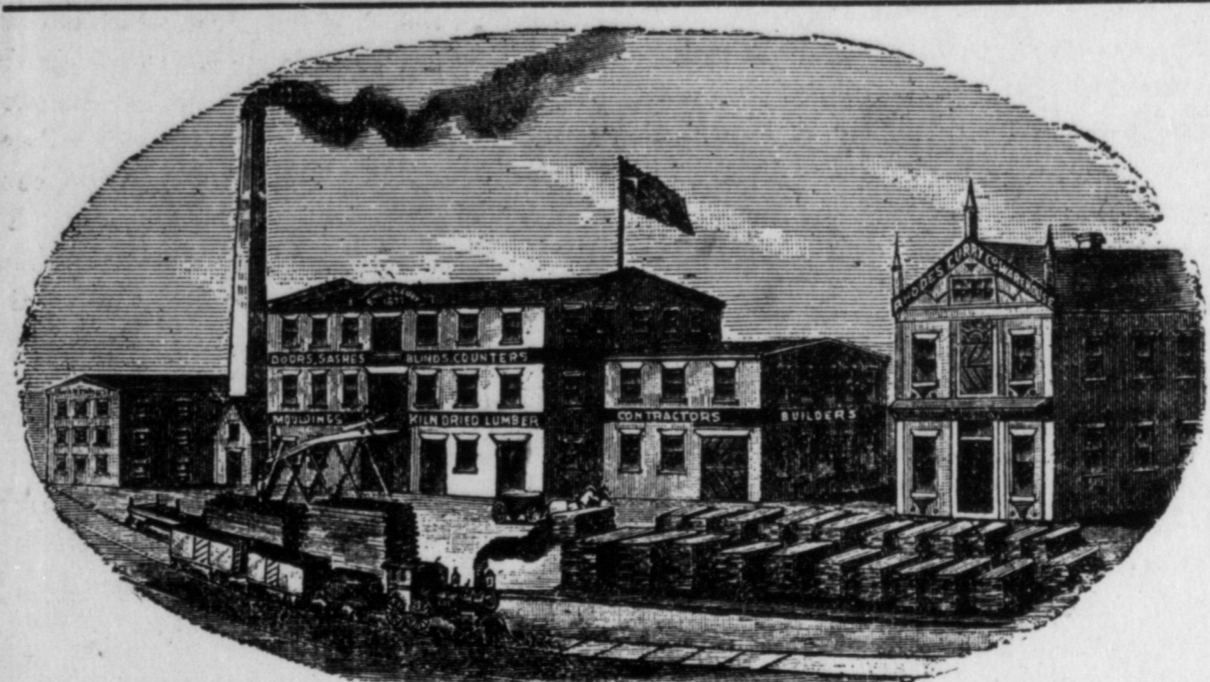
