## AN AUBURN MIRACLE.

AN ACT OF HEROISM FOLLOWED BY  
DIRE RESULTS.

## Titled Bigots.

Petitions from archbishops, bishops and the clergy protesting against the opening of the church are pouring in from all parts of the country. Authority to open the church is withheld pending the subsidence of the agitation.

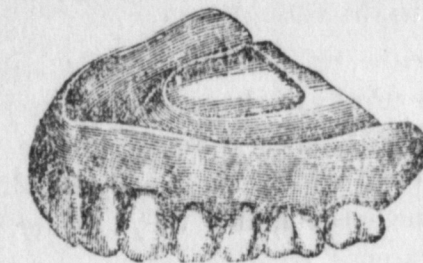

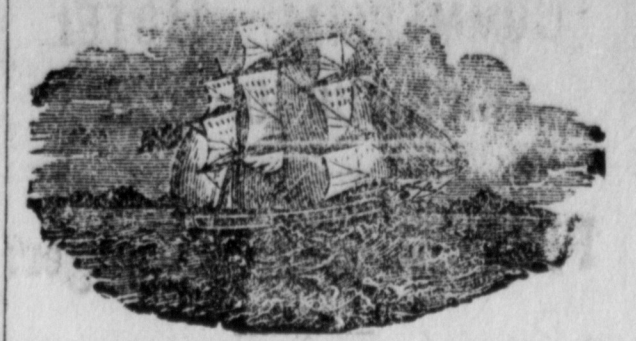
