Bee Notes.

There is more nutriment in one pound

of honey than in five pounds of pork.

There is very little honey upon the

market this year, either in comb or ex-
tracted.

A large capital is not necessary to be
successful with bee-keeping; one should
have a love for bees and a good location
where there is plenty of honey-producing
plants in the vicinity.

A writer in the Bee-keeper's Guide says
that he thinks his bees need salt as much
as the horses, hogs or cattle, and he keeps
a supply of water that has been slightly
salted near them, and they prefer it to
fresh water.

A writer in Bee-keeper's Review says
if bees are wintered in the cellar they
should be put there about Nov. 10 to 20,
and the cellar should be dry, well ven-
tilated, pure and sweet, and should be kept
at a temperature of forty-five degrees.
If wintered on their summer stands they
should be in chaff-packed hives, with good
roof that will exclude snow or rain.

A courier from San Juan mining camp
Col. reports a terrible battle there on
Tuesday in which eleven men were killed
and a large number wounded. The direct
cause of the trouble was the discovery of
large nuggets of gold at the bottom of a
small stream. Each man claimed he had
first located the ground, and to settle the
dispute guns were brought into play.
Over forty men engaged in the fight.
Few if any escaped unhurt. A private
despatch from Dolores confirms the re-
port.

The famine in the Government of Ule-
bory Sweden, threatens to cause an exodus
of the poorer people. Hundreds have
gone to the coast of Bothnia to seek means
of emigrating. Uleabory city is crowded
with starving peasants. In the interior
the people are reported to be dying by
scores.

For several days two keepers of the
beacon lighthouse, Oswego, were im-
prisoned by ice. They ran up a flag of
distress and a relief party, consisting of
Capt. Gowan and Capt. Frank McMaster,
started in a small boat, and after a terrible
battle of three hours with ice waves suc-
ceeded in landing the suffering men, who
had been without food for two days.

The Dreibund nations, Germany, Italy
and Austria, regard the situation in France
as menacing the peace of Europe and are
exchanging frequent notes on the subject.
They have decided to hold themselves in
readiness to act promptly from a military
point of view in the event of a revolution
in France.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Government has refused to com-
mute the death sentence passed upon
Sing Kee, a Chinaman, convicted of mur-
der at Nanaimo, B. C. He will be hanged
on the 16th of January.
