## Children Charged With Murder.

PHILLIPS, Wis., Dec. 22.—Herman and Hans Anderson, aged 11 and 15 years, of Brennon, Price county, are now in jail charged with the murder of Marcus Humfeldt of Rock Falls, Lincoln county. The murder was committed December 7, and was not known till yesterday, when by reason of the confession of one of the younger boys the older one was arrested. The boy Hans, who committed the murder, seems to be a hardened little wretch.

The morning of Dec. 6 Hans had trouble with his parents and determined to leave home. He persuaded his younger brother to steal a gun from the house, and together they started through the woods, and, arriving at the victim's home, they applied for lodging. He refused, but they hid in the barn and remained over the night. The next morning Humfeldt gave them their breakfast and told them they must leave, as he was going after lumber and would not have them around the shanty.

Words ensued and the oldest boy started to leave, and when about thirty paces off turned and finding his victim's back to him, pulled up his gun, cried, "Good-bye, Marcus," and fired, the shot killed him instantly. They left the body where it fell and took possession of the shanty, where they remained until yesterday morning. The body of the murdered man was not removed for three or four days, when the boys dragged it behind the barn and buried it in the manure heap.

This is the older boy's story. The younger's varies only as to the time of the shooting. He claims that Humfeldt did leave that morning, and was shot by his brother, who was in hiding, when he returned.

## Loaded With Diamonds.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—United States Consul Wildman has just arrived and tells of an Asiatic potentate who will soon visit this country loaded down with more diamonds than belong to any other ruler. It is the Sultan of Jahore. The sultan is a personage of note. His claims to distinction are, first, that he is the only independent ruler in southern Asia, and, second, that he can decorate his person with more diamonds than any other person. His subjects number half a million and inhabit 13,000 square miles.

When in full regalia he strings \$10,000,000 worth of diamonds from his shoulders. How he can afford to dress so extravagantly is explained by the manner in which the infant industries are fostered in Jahore. There are 200,000 Chinese in the kingdom, most of them addicted to the opium habit and each Chinese pays a tribute of \$1 a month for the privilege of hitting the pipe. The gambling privileges of the kingdom yield his majesty an income of \$1,000,000 a year also.

The sultan will visit Washington in person, attended by a train of princes and other dignitaries. The royal troupe of Malay dancing girls will be of the party. The royal party will be the guests of the country for four months. The sultan is a remarkable old man according to the description given of him by Mr. Wildman. He is six feet tall, with noble bearing and great executive ability, keeping his cabinet and the various interests of the kingdom well in hand.

## Fight For a Wife.

MOUNT CARMEL, Pa., Dec. 27.—A fight took place here Thursday between John Roteski and Michael Lincevitch. Both are Hungarians. John left Hungary with Mary Dousky, to whom he was married on reaching New York. Lincevitch was in love with the girl and followed them to this country for the purpose of being revenged. About fifty railroad workmen witnessed the fray. Mary was selected as referee and, it is alleged, agreed to take the victor for her husband. The fight lasted forty minutes, when completely exhausted and bleeding profusely Lincevitch was unable to stand up any longer. A foul was claimed on account of Roteski's chewing his opponent's ear, and a riot began. The girl sided with her husband's friends, and she was knocked senseless. Weapons of all kinds were used, and ten or twelve bullets found their way through the crowd. Nearly all the fifty were badly cut and bruised, and six of them are in a precarious condition. Roteski with his face all bandaged up left Friday for Shenandoah accompanied by Mary.

## Live Stock notes.

Use dry straw for bedding. Small hogs make the best meat. The eye of the owner fattens the stock. Oil meal with bran makes a capital ration.

A thrifty hog should never squeal for his food.

A few hogs are necessary to eat up the waste.

A little turpentine in the feed is good for worms in hogs. Select the largest, most growthy and best sows for breeders.

The most essential items with hogs are good health and thrift.

It is always an item to feed growing pigs for bone and muscle.

One or more good brood sows are a positive necessity on every farm.

Too much fat with growing pigs will check the growth of bone and muscle.

Hogs kept by neat, systematic farmers are generally the freest from disease.

When skim milk is fed to the pigs a little bran and oil meal stirred in will greatly improve it.

Keep the bedding and remove the bedding material sufficiently often to keep it from becoming foul.

Brood sows thrive better with plenty of range during the day and a warm place to sleep in at night.

The start that a pig gets in the first three months of its life has much to do with its thrift and future profit.

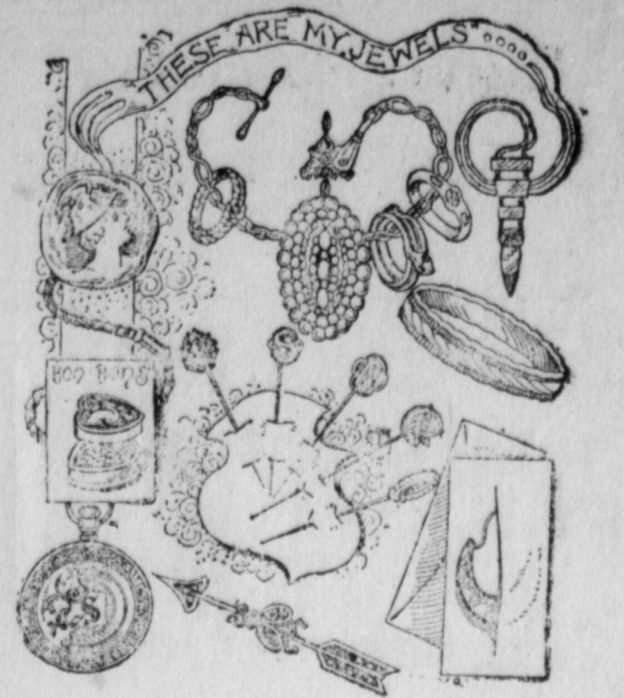
