The following section of the new code will be of interest to many :- Everyone is guilty of an indictable offence, and liable to one years's imprisonment and to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, who (a) uses or knowingly allows any part of any premises under his control to be used for the purpose of recording or registering any bet or wager, or selling any pool; or (b) keeps, exhibits or employs, or knowingly allows to be kept, exhibited or employed, in any part of any premises under his control, any device or apparatus for the purpose of recording any bet or wager or selling any pool; or (c) becomes the custodian or depository of any money, property or valuable thing staked, wagered or pledged; or (d) records or registers anv bet or wager, or sells any pool upon the result-(1) of any political or municipal election, (2) of any race, (3) of any contest or trial of skill or endurance of man or beast.


