Board of Health.

Dr. Bourque, secretary of the Board of Health for the county of Kent, has received the following communication from the secretary of the Provincial Board.

FREDERICTON, N. B., June 20, 1893. Dear Sir:

The Provincial Board of Health desires to again call the attention of Local Boards to the probability of Cholera being brought into this Province during the present summer, to the great necessity of extra precautions being taken to obviate this, and to prevent it obtaining a foothold should it be introduced by any means.

Particular attention should be given to this in counties or towns upon the border of the Province, along the coast, or such as have any direct communication with places outside the Province. This remark applies with nearly equal force to every county in the Province.

Special attention to cleanliness is also of not less importance at the present time and should at this season of the year receive immediate attention throughout the entire Province.

Cholera is essentially a filth disease, and although it may not orginate in this way, it is certain that all insanitary conditions favor its propagation very largely. Cleanliness in every respect, absolute and continued, always so essential to health, is at the present time of more than ordinary importance.

In view of this it is earnestly hoped these matters may receive prompt attention from all Local Health Authorities, and the cordial co-operation of the people in general in every community. J. Z. CURRIE,


