Dominion Day.

Fears were entertained that the long-wished for rain would make an appearance on Saturday, and thus mar the fun. But Old Sol arose in all his splendor, and dashed away all fears and doubts.

By ten o'clock the streets and warves were crowded with people, all dressed in holiday attire and ready to enjoy themselves to the full extent of their abilities. The vessels in the harbour, the court house and hotels were covered with bunting and gave the town a fine appearance. All morning boats were sailing up and down the river, but at ten o'clock the race course was cleared and everybody repaired to the wharf to see the start. The judges were Geo. V. McInerney, Sheriff Wheten, and David McAlmon.

The first race called was the sailing match. Thirteen boats had entered, but owing to some misunderstanding, the George C, owned by Joseph Michaud, did not start.

At the report of a pistol, the boats started. When bunched together they made a fine sight, but as they drew away from the wharf and became separated, the possible winners could only be guessed at.

The first boat around the buoy on the river was the Dreadnought. She was on her second tack up, when the other boats turned in a bunch. The heat up river was close and exciting. The Micmac had gained considerably on the Dreadnought, and the two boats made a pretty race till the rounding of the upper buoy, the Dreadnought being a few yards ahead. The third boat to round the stake was the Julius Caesar. On the run home, the Dreadnought beat the Micmac about one hundred yards, but twenty yards from the finish, she became becalmed, and the Micmac came in the winner amidst the cheering of the assembled people. Dreadnought was second, Julius Caesar third. The Dreadnought is the sloop that won the race at Miramichi in the summer of 1890.

The rowing race was next on the programme. Ten boats entered, and all started. The race up to the stake-boat was very close. The first boat around was the Kent, manned by Daniel O'Leary and Edward Barnett; next came the Bronco, manned by George Ameraux and David Thompson; closely followed by the Ashton, manned by Philip Thompson and George Finnigan. The race for the remaining distance, was between these three boats, as all the other boats perceived their chances to be slim, gradually dropped out. The Bronco was the winner, Kent, second and Ashton third.

After the regatta was finished, the people lined the sides of the main street to witness the foot-races and other sports. George Finnigan won the half-mile race, James Lawson a close second. In the hundred yard dash, Fred Richard proved to the townsfolk, that his abilities as a runner, are of a high grade, and that they have a champion in whom confidence can be placed. John Scott ran a good race, still Richard won handily. The sprinters of Kingston, for some reason or another, did not make an appearance. The remaining races, consisting of sack-races and potato-races etc., were well contested, and proved interesting to the on-lookers. During the races, the St. Louis band, headed by our genial citizen, Basil Johnson, poured forth their sweet strains of music, and in the evening, they paraded the streets to the delight of all hands. The judges are to be congratulated on the impartial manner in which they conducted everything that fell to their care. Special thanks have to be rendered to the energetic managers, Fred Sayre and William Forbes. Besides arranging all the preliminaries, they hustled around on Saturday in a manner truly remarkable. Through no fault of theirs, the fire-works did not arrive, but a fine display will be made at their earliest convenience.

Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Miramichi met on the 27th ult., in St. John's Church, Dalhousie. Present Rev. Messrs. McCoy, Moderator, Millar, Carr, Fisher, Sutherland, Nicholson, Greenlee, Thompson, McKay, Hamilton, and Cameron. Communion was received on behalf of McDonald, Mair, Armstrong, and Carruthers, elders. Rev. J. McCoy retiring moderator addressed the court in suitable terms. Rev. Geo. Fisher unanimously elected moderator for ensuing year, also addressed the court.

Rev. Neil McKay reelected clerk with the expression of many good wishes.

Standing committees appointed.

Report of commissioners to General Assembly.—Rev. Wm. Hamilton reported that he had discharged the duties imposed on him by the Presbytery by regularly attending the meetings of Assembly, and to the best of his ability taking part in the proceedings; that the assembly was one of the largest ever held; that the various discussions were conducted in a fine spirit; that a great amount of important business was transacted; and that Dr. Sedgwick, moderator, who had been nominated by the Presbytery, nobly sustained the dignity of the chair through out.

Deputation to Weldford consisting of Rev. Messrs. McCoy, Carr, and McKay. Reported that they had visited Weldford

and adjoining stations, and gave a detailed account of meetings held, with best results. The report was received, and their diligence commended.

Call to minister.—Rev. J. A. Cameron presented a call from the congregation of Weldford in favor of Rev. James Stevenson signed by 111 members and 42 adherents. Mr. Cameron stated that the call was unanimous and most cordial. He dwelt at considerable length on the state and requirements of congregation. The call was duly sustained. In connection therewith it was resolved that a supplement beasked from the S. Committee. Ordination and induction of Mr. Stevenson to take place in Weldford, on the last Tuesday of July. Rev. A. F. Thompson to preach on the occasion.

The Rev. Geo. Fisher, in the absence of Rev. Messrs. Kinnear and Fowler, deputation to New Carlisle, Hopetown, and Port Daniel, read a lengthy report and gave full details of the state of the congregation. Rev. J. McCoy dwelt on the report with considerable minuteness, and spoke of the faithfulness of the deputation in the discharge of their duty. Report accepted, and diligence of deputation commended. Agreed to apply to supplementary committee the grant for congregation.

Resignation.—Rev. J. A. Cameron, who at a previous meeting resigned the pastoral charge of Bass River, etc., dwelt on the reasons of his resignation, chief of which was on account of his health; stated the deep regret he had in parting with his people. Mr. Donald Campbell, representative of congregation, very feelingly and fully stated the high esteem in which their beloved pastor was held by the people; the great work he had accomplished among them; and that the congregation only consented to his resignation as it was considered it would be to the advantage of Mr. Cameron. The Presbytery while accepting the resignation of Mr. Cameron, testified to the ability and faithfulness of Mr. Cameron as a gospel minister, and that it was with deep regret they parted with such a worthy brother. Rev. J. A. Greenlee appointed to declare the congregation vacant on 9th July.

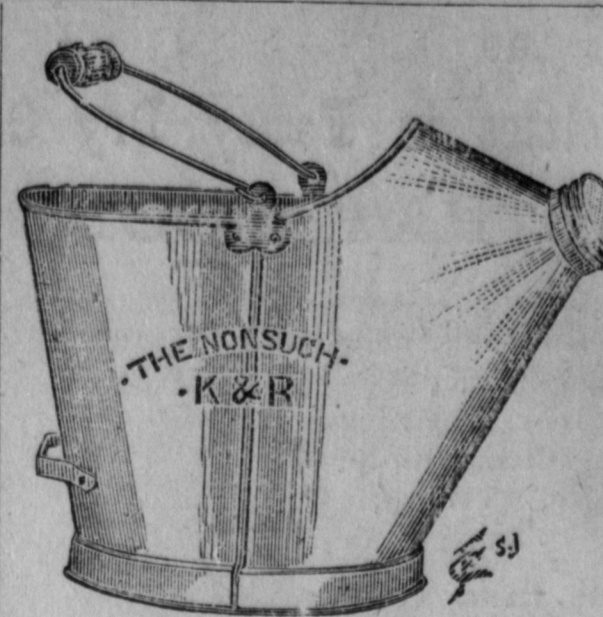

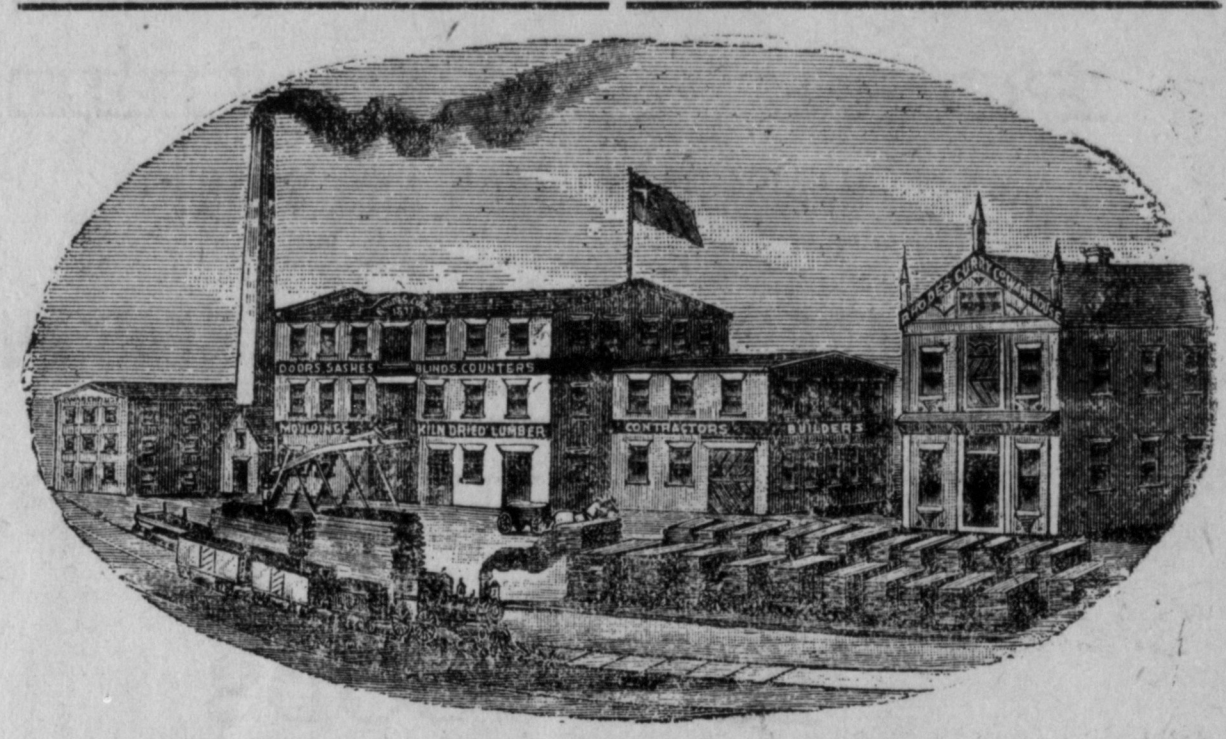
