

LOCAL NEWS.

BARQUE VALONA.—The hull and a part of the outfit and rigging of the wrecked barque Valona were resold at public auction Tuesday, on account of the failure of Messrs. Sumner Co., of Moncton, to comply with the terms of first sale. Messrs. Jardine were the purchasers.

LECTURE.—Mr. John Robertson, provincial dairy commissioner, delivered an interesting and instructive lecture in the Temperance Hall, Kingston, last Wednesday afternoon; subject,—Farming that will pay. All the leading farmers of the surrounding districts were in attendance.

TRUSTEES APPOINTED.—At a meeting held in the Temperance Hall, Kingston, last Wednesday evening, Messrs. O. Smith, J. H. Abbott, A. B. Carson, John McInerney and John Jardine were appointed a board of trustees, to purchase a site and erect a new public hall in trust for public purposes.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Robert Wathen died very suddenly Sunday afternoon from apoplexy. He ate his dinner as usual and was ill only a short time. Mr. Wathen was thirty-five years of age and was formerly a guard at the Maritime penitentiary, which position he gave up about four years ago on account of ill health.

Every man above the age of twenty-one years is entitled to be enrolled as a voter.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.—A sad fatality occurred at Jardineville, Friday evening, by which George Gould, aged nine years lost his life. He was helping with the farm work on Jardine's farm and was assisting in unloading a cartload of potatoes at the greenhouse. After the cart had been placed in position he went to the hind end of it to help dump the potatoes, when the horse suddenly started backwards and the lad's head was caught between the cart and the green house. A doctor was at once sent for and every attention rendered the poor boy, but his brain had been crushed and he lived only fifteen minutes after the accident. A coroner's jury impaneled Saturday under the direction of Dr. Doherty; Coroner, returned a verdict of accidental death.

The vote then stood, Pineau 68, Barriault 68, and the chairman gave his casting vote in favor of Barriault.
