News comes from St. Mathias, a small place on the Richelieu river, 20 miles from Montreal, of a terrible affray by which a wealthy farmer named Edward Beauvais was fatally wounded by several of his tenants who rushed upon him with knives and clubs. It appears that Beauvais had a dispute, some time ago, with a tenant named Gaillon and notified him to leave. This enraged Gaillon and yesterday the Gaillon family laid in wait for Beauvais as he left his house for the railway station intending to go to Montreal. They attacked Beauvais, then another tenant named Stebenne rushed to his rescue. The melee lasted for some time, the result being that Beauvais was stabbed in eight places about the body and beaten into insensibility with clubs. Stebenne was seriously injured and is in a precarious condition. Beauvais cannot recover.

One-fifth of the world's population of 1,480,000,000 is found by Gen. A. W. Greeley to live in the 500 cities in which the populations exceed 50,000. Of these cities the United States has 85; India, 76; Great Britain, 73; Germany, 47; Russia, 34; France, 33; Japan, 17; Spain, 16; Austria-Hungary, 14; Italy, 14. One-sixth of these cities belong to the United States, which also contains three of the ten cities having 1,000,000 inhabitants. Of the largest 100 cities, 52 are under the control of English speaking races. Popular cities are a modern product, as is shown by the fact that the United States had no city of 100,000 inhabitants at the beginning of the century and England had but one, while these countries now have 25 and 24 respectively.

After going three miles, when the train had attained a speed of fifty miles an hour, the fireman jumped, but almost miraculously was not killed. Other trainmen did not dare to jump, and after a speed of 106 miles an hour was indicated on the gauge in the caboose they succeeded in stopping the train by the hand brakes. This hill, which is twelve miles long, has a descent of over 100 feet to the mile the entire distance. Last year a train became unmanageable and gained a speed of 120 miles an hour as shown by the speed indicator before it went into the ditch.

He was at once taken to the prisoner. Now, what relation was the prisoner to the visitor?

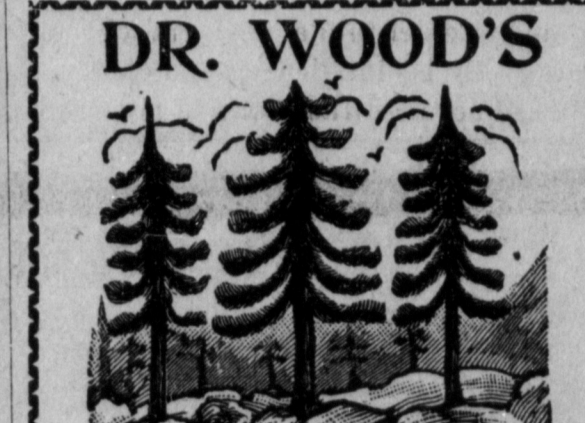
