On the Free List. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20.—Before the sub-committee of the ways and means committee having in charge the schedules of the tariff bill adjourn this afternoon from their little secret room at the capitol they will have put into shape the new tariff bill.

Chairman Wilson has sent out word to a number of personal friends who called to see him, among them three or four interested persons from New York, that he cannot see anyone today, as the last touches are being placed upon the measure which has been keeping him busy for three months.

The bill will be somewhat resisted by the full democratic membership of the committee on ways and means before it will be laid before the entire committee, the first of next week, but it may be stated that it will have few material changes from its present figures.

The Wilson tariff bill will fairly represent the pledges of the Chicago platform. It will recognize the assertion that a tariff for protective purposes is unconstitutional, and will levy duties only for revenue.

The bill will make what might well be termed a "slashing cut." The aim has been, as far as possible, to make horizontal reductions. Where labor has most largely entered into the product, the reduction has been less than where capital has been the consideration.

Glass and steel received the deepest cuts. Blown glass is reduced about one-half, but plate glass is reduced about 15 per cent only. Steel rails are heavily cut, and the duties are made ad valorem instead of specific.

A RELIC OF CHALDEA.

A very interesting find was made in a royal palace of ancient Armenia by M. de Sarzac, who has been carrying on excavations in Chaldea by permission of the Turkish Government. It was the colossal head of an immense lance, made of copper bronze, 14 centimeters wide and 80 long, with six holes to attach it to its handle.

BLEEDING BREAD.

A Year in Jail.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—The Hon. Thomas McGreevy, ex-M. P., and N. K. Connolly, President of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company, were Wednesday morning found guilty of conspiracy to defraud Her Majesty of large sums of money and were sentenced to one year each in the common jail. After the jury returned with the verdict they made a recommendation for mercy. Previous to the Judge delivering the sentence application was made for its postponement but unavailingly. The Judge after addressing the prisoners at length said:—Your punishment, Thomas McGreevy, has come fast upon your offence. In your position, Nicholas Connolly, the sentence, whatever it be, will fall heavily. I have thought of your personal inconvenience and in order that undue sympathy may not be evoked in your behalf the sentence I am about to pass may appear too light, but to you it will probably appear heavy enough."

QUEEN'S CO. TRAGEDY.

Unfortunately no ante mortem deposition was taken but the witnesses who heard his account of the shooting testified that at the time he gave it, the wounded boy was in such a condition that he knew his death was near at hand. The story he told, according to their testimony, was substantially that which has already been related in the columns of The Telegraph: That he went into the woods with the Brown boys and seeing some spruce gum up a tree intimated his intention of climbing up and getting it; that Judson Brown said to him that if he (Rothburne) climbed the tree he would shoot him; that he did climb the tree and after he had done so Judson Brown pointed the gun at him and fired it, wounding him so that he fell to the ground. Further he said that as soon as the shooting was done the Brown boys ran away and left him. Such is the statement which several witnesses declare Abner Rothburne made in their presence shortly before his death, and most people here believe it to be true, owing to the fact that the Brown boys left Rothburne after he had been shot, gave no alarm to anybody in regard to his condition, and acted as if they relied on Rothburne being found dead, so that no information would reach the public as to how he came by his death. The Brown boys in their testimony stated that the shooting was accidental, and that no threats were used. The verdict of the jury was as follows:—That from the evidence the jury find that Abner Rothburne came to his death by a shot discharged from a gun in the hands of Judson Brown.
