# On the Free List.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20.—Before the sub-committee of the ways and means committee having in charge the schedules of the tariff bill adjourn this afternoon from their little secret room at the capitol they will have put into shape the new tariff bill.

Chairman Wilson has sent out word to a number of personal friends who called to see him, among them three or four interested persons from New York, that he cannot see anyone today, as the last touches are being placed upon the measure which has been keeping him busy for three months.

The bill will be somewhat resisted by the full democratic membership of the committee on ways and means before it will le laid before the entire committee, the first of next week, but it may be stated that it will have few material changes

from its present figures. The Wilson tariff bill will fairly represent the pledges of the Chicago platform. It will recognize the assertion that a tariff for protective purposes is unconstitutional, and will levy duties only for revenue.

The principal difficulty experienced by the democratic members in reaching an agreement on the bill arises from the proposed income tax.

There is but little doubt that this tax will form a feature of the bill, but it will be bitterly opposed by some of the leading democrats. The committee has asked the treasury department for a history of the income tax in the United States. Figures show that in 1866 it amounted to over \$60,000,000 and in 1870, the last year it was collected with the exemption figure raised, it reached the sum of over \$27,-000,000.

All the members here anticipate a lively fight when the bill is submitted to the house. It is largely in accordance with the democratic platform, but is not apt to be acceptable to any of the leading interests which it effects.

While there was today a slight increase in the amount of cash in the treasury, the amount is still below \$100,000,000. The expenditures for the month to date exceed the receipts by \$4,643,000. The pension payments for the month to date were \$11,457,000.

known in Germany as "Blut im Brode," and to us as bleeding bread, has appeared biscuit, but also boiled potatoes, rice, and other farinaceous substances, on which red stains appear, resembling blotches of blood. AGRICULTURIST PUB. Co., (L'td.) In former times, before their nature was knowr, these blood-stains created much consternation amongst the superstitious as portents of calamity. The first modern naturalist who described it in scientific terms was Dr. Sette, of Venice, who recorded its appearance in Padua in 1819, and gave it the name of Zoogalactina imetropha. In this instance, it is stated that "a peasant of Liguara, near Padua, was terrified by the sight of blood-stains cattered over some polenta, which had been made and shut up in a cupboard on the previous evening. Next day similar patches appeared on the bread, meat, and other articles of food in the same cupboard. It was naturally regarded as a miracle and warning from heaven, until the case had been submitted to a Paduan naturalist, who easily recognized the presence of a microscopic plant."

The present determination of this organism, according to some, is Micrococcus prodigiosus, but according to others it is Bacillus prodigiosus, and, consequently, one of the Schizomycetes .- Nature, London.
