

LOCAL NEWS.

THANKSGIVING DAY.—Thanksgiving services were held in the Methodist church, Richibucto, in the morning and in St. Mary's Episcopal church in the evening.

A BRIDGE GONE.—One of the spans of the St. Louis bridge broke down Thursday and the cars have now to go four miles up the river to the next crossing. The ice will soon bridge the river for the winter.

ST. LOUIS AMONG THE SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITORS.—Among the successful exhibitors of butter at the World's fair are P. L. Richard, of the St. Louis, butter factory; M. McLachlin, St. Joseph, W. W. Hubbard, Kingsclear, and I. Neilles, Mauge.

SWORN IN.—Mr. A. Leger was sworn in as Sheriff, Thursday, by Charles J. Sayre, barrister, to whom the deimus had been sent. Mr. Leger will not move to town until the 20th December. In the meantime ex-Sheriff Wheten will occupy the Court House.

WEDDING BELLS.—The marriage of Mr. Wm. H. Irving of Buctouche, to Miss Helen Ingalls, of Shediac, takes place at Knox Church, Shediac, this (Wednesday) afternoon. The happy couple will take an extended wedding trip before returning to their home in Buctouche.

PRICE WEBBER COMING.—The Boston Comedy Co. will appear in the Temperance Hall, Richibucto, on the evening of Dec. 5th. The Comedy, "The Honey-moon or How to rule a wife," will be presented for the first time. Go and hear it, you will not be disappointed.

ENTERTAINMENT.—The children of St. Mary's Sabbath School, Richibucto, will give an entertainment in the Temperance hall next Saturday evening, for the purpose of raising funds for the school library. The programme will consist of recitations, dialogues, plays, solos, choruses etc. Performance opens at 7.30. All are invited.

LOST HIS HAND.—Mr. Chas. Smith, while working at a thrashing machine at Mr. Jas Barnes' place at Buctouche, had the misfortune to get his right hand caught and terribly mangled. Doctors LeBlanc and King, who were called, found it necessary to amputate the hand. Mr. Smith is a married man and the father of a family of small children, making the accident all the more deplorable.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY MEETING.—At a recent meeting of the Agricultural Society of St. Louis and Carleton it was resolved to hold no exhibition next year, but to apply the provincial grant to the society to the payment of the debt on the butter factory. A number of interested parties are dissatisfied with this move and are petitioning the government to refuse to assent to the proposed change.

RETURNED FROM THEIR WEDDING TOUR.—Mr. and Mrs. B. S. Smith returned from their wedding trip Friday, and were met at Buctouche station by a crowd of friends armed with guns, tin pans, etc., and given a hearty charivari. In the evening a number of the employees of the B. & M. met and presented the newly wedded pair with an address accompanied with a handsome silver tilting pitcher and goblet.

NOT NECESSARY.—Upon the petition of a number of land owners in the town of Richibucto to open a new street running North from the K. N. Railway station parallel with Pagan street, road commissioners Frecker and Beattie summoned a jury before Justice John T. Caie, Monday. The jury after looking over the proposed street, came to the conclusion that it was not necessary in the interest of the public and refused to report favorably.

BASKET SOCIAL.—The basket social and entertainment in Kingston in aid of the new hall, on Thursday evening, netted fifty-two dollars. The prize awarded for the young lady's basket that brought the highest price, fell to Miss Bertie Curran, whose basket sold for four dollars. A musical programme, made up of choruses, duets and two solos, one by Miss Mary Main of Galloway, and the other by Fred Doherty, were well received. The accompaniments were played by Miss Lena D'Oniqui, who recently returned from Spain. Including what has been subscribed with the cash on hand, the hall fund now amounts to over \$800. The building will be started next spring.

FISHERY DISPUTES.—Fishery Inspector A. Chapman was in Richibucto last Thursday settling disputes between rival claimants to smelt fishing grounds. It appears that a number of fishermen secured places on the Kouchibouguac and Kouchibouguac Rivers for the alleged purpose of fishing bass, but really to secure them as smelt fishing grounds, and with this end in view put down stakes to await the opening of the smelt fishing season. Complaint was made, an inquiry held, and the result is that no bass licenses are to be granted for fishing below St. Louis bridge. The fishermen whose places were taken have received them back. On Friday Inspector Chapman drove to Buctouche to settle disputes which had arisen there over smelt fishing claims.

The little fellow lost his hold and fell to the ground, one of the wheels passing over his head. He sustained such injuries that he died Monday morning.

—The shingle factory at River Charlo was closed for the season on the 18th inst. During the last seven months it has cut about fifteen million shingles—nearly two million more than the former season— which stand high in point of quality in the Boston market. The proprietors are Messrs. Gray, Lawrence and Co., who reside in the States.

—A Dalhousie correspondent of the Enterprise says: Mr. Vanier was here this week. He belongs to France and has been in Carleton since May last in connection with the oyster industry. He placed 20,000 oysters in the Carleton Barachois and now has full hope of the success of his scheme. He says that if his hopes are fully realized he will extend his work to some parts of Restigouche.

—Joseph Leclaire, aged 21, brakeman on the Intercolonial railway, was missed Friday, from the train from River du Loup on its arrival at Chaudiere station, and on search being made his body was found head downwards in a culvert near the Chaudiere curve. A coroner's inquest was held and the verdict of the jury was death from effusion of blood produced by the pressure of fractured bones of the skull upon the brain.

—On Tuesday, the 21st, Edward Alexander and Miss Tina Gorham were united in marriage at the Presbyterian church Campbellton. The bride was attended by Miss Julia Gorham, and John Deboo was the best man for Mr. Alexander. After the service a number of invited guests assembled at the house of the bride's mother, where a sumptuous supper was served. Mr. and Mrs. Alexander left on the Montreal express en route for Chicago and other western cities.

—The unusual and startling sound of a cannon salute from the public wharf was heard at Newcastle Wednesday evening. The occasion which called forth such a demonstration was the arrival of the bark Ruby, Capt. Ferguson, on her fourth trip across the Atlantic to the port of Miramichi. The event being without parallel in the history of the port, it was decided to give the captain and crew a welcome not soon to be forgotten. The boys' band serenaded the vessel as she was towed in to the wharf at Ritchie's mill, while the little boys cheered and shouted and the cannon boomed over the water.

—The adjourned meeting at Chatham, re incorporation was held in the Masonic hall Saturday night. John Sheriff was chairman and W. T. Connors secretary. W. S. Loggie presented the report of the committee. The speakers in favor of the adoption of the report were R. A. Lawlor, D. G. Smith, J. I. Stewart, R. Murray and Andrew Morrison; and against it, J. D. R. F. McKenzie, N. Cunningham, Frank Cassidy and S. J. Frost. The hall was crowded, and about three to one were against the bill. After considerable discussion it was moved the meeting adjourn, and so the incorporation scheme has been practically defeated in Chatham.

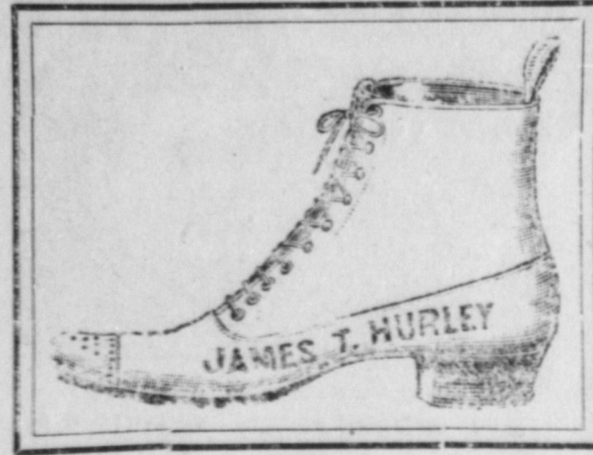
