THE PARDONING POWER.

The assassination of Carter H. Harrison Mayor of Chicago, at his residence last Saturday, has thrown a cloud over the closing proceedings of the great exhibition. It is claimed by physicians that consumption is not hereditary and cannot be transmitted from parent to child; only a predisposition to the disease—a liability to attack—can be handed from one generation to the next. The law of Michigan should therefore if rigidly enforced in the course of a few years settle the question, and throw more light on the causes of consumption.


