The Cholera Scourge.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—The report of Thomas E. Heenan, U. S. Consul at Odessa, Russia, which reached the Marine hospital service to-day, shows an alarming condition of affairs in that country. He says that the official bulletin for the week ending August 12, shows there has been 2,133 cases of cholera and 768 deaths in various governments of European Russia.

TUNIS, Sept. 7.—Cholera spread rapidly in Tozer and Neft on the west shore of Lake Alsibkah. Two hundred fresh cases have been found in the two towns in the last 20 days.

SUEZ, Sept. 7.—Seven seamen who shipped at Swansea, Wales, on the steamer Enna for the Red Sea ports have died of cholera. The Enna carried a large number of Mecca pilgrims. Between two hundred and three hundred of these pilgrims died aboard the ship.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—This afternoon it was reported that a woman employed in the House of Commons had died this morning of a disease with choleraic symptoms. As soon as the House of Commons was ready for general business, Mr. Asquith, home secretary, was questioned concerning the case. He replied that the health officers had made a hasty examination of the body, but would not yet undertake to pronounce the case Asiatic cholera, although they regarded the symptoms as suspicious.

BERLIN, Sept. 7.—Dr. Monard's report on the condition of France says Nantes is at present the centre of the cholera epidemic, the outbreak there being apparently due to contamination of the Loire. The epidemic in the south of France is rapidly declining. The Rhine has been officially proclaimed to be infected with cholera and bathing in it has been forbidden.

struck them. The innermost boat parted her cable and ran into the next boat, injuring her badly. The two men climbed into the good boat and then were blown out to sea. The third boat only held for a short time after, when she was also carried before the wind. They tried during the night to get control of their boats, but the sails were all blown to pieces, and they also lost their rudders. The men were picked up about halfway between Perce and E. E. Island, upwards of sixty miles from land. In accordance with instructions from the minister of Marine the men were given five dollars each with which to reach their homes.

Mobbed French Priests.

VICTORIA, B. C., September 7.—The North China Daily News of August 2, received by the steamer "Empress of China," contains the following advices from Hankow, under date of July 20:—News has arrived of the destruction by a mob of the French Roman Catholic chapel in the town of Genkiawana, near the city of Mien-Yang, about one hundred miles west of Hankow. The foreign priests in charge escaped to the neighboring town. No lives were lost, though several native houses shared in the destruction. The French Consul is enquiring into the circumstances.

Japan has during the past month experienced fires and earthquakes. The entire village of Lyenokami, in Tamba province, was burned on August 16, and sixty-five lives were lost. The village of Hon Tomari, Kitami province, was destroyed twelve days previously, one hundred and twenty-four houses being consumed, but without a fatality. On August 6th the town of Hakozaki, Fukuowa prefecture, comprising sixty houses, were also destroyed, and upwards of two hundred persons were endangered.

Other disasters in the Orient were: An explosion in the Yabarana coal mines, near Sorachi, by which nineteen persons were killed. On August 21 eleven pilgrims lost their lives during a storm while ascending Mount Frip. The district of Tung Chow, near Pekin, was flooded, in consequence of heavy rains, causing great loss of life and doing much damage to property. Chinese pirates recently captured the steamer of the Chinese consulate at Penang, killing twenty-four persons and wounding one hundred, and securing booty to the amount of \$20,000.

A Fearful Tragedy Enacted. MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Sept. 9.—Paul Holliday, a widower, who resided near Burlington, at the foot of the Shawangunk Mountains, recently married a young woman who had been working for him. Soon after the marriage Holliday's house and barn was burned, and his crippled son was burned to death in the house. Mrs. Holliday was arrested for arson. She showed evidence of insanity and was sent to the State Hospital, and being sub-

sequently released returned home. The latter part of the week Holliday was missed. Mrs. Holliday, when questioned, said he had gone to Bloomingburg to work as a mason. Mrs. Holliday made some enquiries as to what would remove blood-stains, and she was arrested. A searching party was made up to look for Holliday, and in the barn on his place they found, under a lot of hay, the bodies of two women—one, that of a fleshy woman about forty-five, and the other about nineteen. The identity of the dead women is not known, but it is thought that they were summer boarders from New York City. The post mortem examination reveals eight bullets in the woman and several in the girl in the region of the heart. The woman had been dead a week, but the girl not over 48 hours. Mrs. Holliday is reported to have been up all Sunday night washing. Yesterday she became so violent she had to be handcuffed. Diligent search has failed to discover the body of Mr. Holliday. Some think he has run away, but others scoff at this idea. Friends speak in the highest terms of him. The coroner has commenced an inquest on the bodies of the two women.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Sept. 8.—The body of old Paul Holliday the husband of the woman arrested in connection with the double murder here was found Thursday morning under the Holliday house.

A Ghastly Tale of the Sea. On Wednesday last the steamer Brejadabik, Capt. Nelson, sighted a barque which proved to be the Austrian barque Vila. No one was on board of her. Capboards and cabins had been looted of their contents, and even such cumbersome articles as the furniture, bed clothes and bedding had been taken away. The derelict vessel was in a perfectly sound and seaworthy condition. A prize crew was put on board and the vessel was towed into New York. When the hatches were removed there were found to be stored in bulk thousands of human bones and grinning skulls which had been collected on the deserts of Africa. Superstitious mariners say that the evil spirit followed the Vila when she sailed from the ancient port of Alexandria, for in her cargo were the bones of a famous Arab chief, whose body when once buried his followers said, should not be disturbed. The vandals who desecrated his grave would be followed by the Arabian curse. The bones of the Arab chief were exposed by a simoon and were carted, with the bones of a thousand other unfortunates who had perished on the deserts and in combat, to the holds of the Vila. When the hatches were opened and the skulls met the gaze of the prize crew they had no further desire to remain on the Vila. How, when, or where Capt. Stanos and his crew left the vessel is a mystery.

Murdered by Pirates. VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 8.—The Canadian Pacific steamship Empress of China which arrived Tuesday, brings details of a massacre at Penang by Chinese pirates. The Chinese consul's vessel was captured by the outlaws, who murdered 24 of those on board, injured 15 others and secured \$15,000 of booty.

Penang, or Prince of Wales' island, belongs to Great Britain, to whom it was ceded by the King of Queda, in Malacca, in 1785, who gave it as a marriage portion to his daughter on her becoming the wife of Captain Light, the master of a British ship trading in the straits of Malacca. The island is situated at the north entrance of the straits. George Town is the capital. The form of Penang is very irregular, and the coasts are bold and indented by several bays. There are many small streams, and the surface is intersected by a mountain range. The whole island where not cultivated is densely wooded, and tin ore is said to be abundant in the mountains. Coconuts are extensively cultivated, as well as tropical fruits and vegetables, while the forests yield valuable teak and other timber. The original inhabitants were a few Malays, but since the British occupied the island people from Hindostan, Burmah, Siam, China and all the neighboring islands have settled upon it, nearly one-third of the whole being Chinese.
