—Dr. R. P. Doherty, dentist, will not visit Kent County this month.

—Bark McLeod, from Philadelphia to Richibucto, was spoken off Sydney, C. B., Saturday.
—Mr. and Mrs. John Stevenson, entertained some friends at a whist party Tuesday evening.
—Mr. Daniel Holland has secured the contract of putting on a sparham roof on Mr. K. F. Burns' residence, at Bathurst.
—Read the offer of Wm. Logan, manufacturer of Sterling Soap, St. John, on the first page. Here is a chance to secure \$50.
—John P. Leger has leased the barn of Geo. E. Irving, in Buctouche, formerly occupied by Isaac Trenholm, as a livery stable.
—Capt. Russell of the Rustler has been released on bail. The preliminary examination is to take place at Newcastle on 18th before John Nevins, police magistrate.
—A Carquet dispatch says: Boats in from the Banks report fishing the past week very poor, owing to the scarcity of bait and rough weather. No fishing worthy of note has been done by Carquet boats for the past five weeks.
—H. T. Stevens, of the Moncton Times, publishes an "Open Letter to Sir John Thompson," asking him not to promote Judge Landry, alleging that he was "unfair, unjust and tyrannical" against a person lately tried at Dorchester.
—"Eminence" is a new shade of purple and is very popular in Paris and New York. Greens, browns, and navies, will also have a great run in dress stuffs. Daniel & Robertson, St. John, have them and will send samples on application.
—At the races at St. Stephen this week some very fast time was made in the trotting races. The three minute class was trotted in 2:34 1-5, and the 2:40 class in 2:35, while Brazilian won the free for all in 2:24 4-5. In the 2:32 race Lyncurus came in ahead in 2:29.
—The latest game laws are these: Book agents may be killed from Aug. 1st to Oct. 1st; spring poets from March 1st to July 1st; scandal mongers from Jan. 1st to Dec. 31st, inclusive; umbrella borrowers from Feb. 1st to May 1st and from August 1st to Nov. 1st. Open season all the year on life insurance agents.—Times.
—A very sad accident happened at Eel River on Monday evening. A little boy named LeBlanc, five years of age, while playing near a new well which had not yet been covered, fell in and was not missed for some time. The parents and friends searched till eleven o'clock before his body was found at the bottom of the well.—Enterprise.
—Nova Scotia fishermen say mackerel have not been seen off the coast in such large numbers for twenty years as on Saturday week. Only unfavorable circumstances, high wind and rough sea, prevented immense catches being made. This knocks in the head the theory put forward by some that the fish were disappearing from North Atlantic waters.
—The Austrian bark Tide, Captain Colazio, has arrived at Chatham. The vessel sailed July 23rd from Marseilles. The port was then infected with cholera. The vessel had a clean bill of health. Quarantine Officer McDonald thought it advisable to order the vessel to lower quarantine at Bathurst to discharge her ballast. There is no sickness on board and everybody is in good health.
—The Boston Advertiser says: Mrs. Joseph Gardner, of Moncton, N. B., has disappeared. Mrs. Gardner is between 60 and 70 and very fat and laze. She came from New Brunswick on Wednesday and was to be put on a Cambridge car, she being on her way to visit friends or relatives at 800 Main street, Cambridgeport. It is supposed that she was put on the wrong car. The Cambridge police have begun a search.
—John Moffat's shingle mill at Moffat's Siding, I. C. R., near Campbellton, was totally destroyed by fire on Saturday night between eleven and twelve o'clock. It was insured in the Phoenix of Hartford for \$4,000. The mill has been shut down for nearly two weeks. That the fire was set there can be no doubt, as the fire was discovered at one corner of the mill early on Friday morning, but it was put out by some of the men. The incendiary was more successful this time. There was

about three cars of shingles also burned, and also all Mr. Moffat's lumber outfit.
—Messrs. Farnworth & Jardine, Liverpool, in their circular of Sept. 1, say: The import of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia spruce and pine deals has again been on a large scale, viz., 12,964 standards; the deliveries have been fair, but sales have been forced, and the improvement reported in our last has almost entirely disappeared and recent sales have been a shade easier; the stock is not excessive, but unless the shipments are more moderate during the remainder of the season (and which is expected to be the case) it will be difficult to maintain even present low values. Pine deals are in dull demand.
—A sad accident occurred Monday afternoon in the I. C. R. yard, Campbellton. Two little boys, aged about three and five years, children of Geo. McLean, an employee of the railway, wandered on the track. The youngest got between the cars and had both legs crushed. The poor little fellow died about an hour afterwards. How the accident occurred no one knows, but it is supposed that a special which hauled out of the yard about two o'clock and broke away, in putting back to recouple must have run over the child. When found by his mother his little brother was trying to get him to stand on his feet, not realizing his brother was hurt. Great sympathy is expressed for the parents in their sad bereavement.

—Mr. Bliss Sears, brakeman on the accommodation between Moncton and Campbellton, had a very narrow escape from death at Chatham Junction Wednesday. He was engaged in taking the alarm line over the train while running about eight miles an hour, when the line caught, tripping him and throwing him between two box cars. He fell on the draw bar and in some mysterious manner was thrown clear of the rails. He was seen by one of the train hands and was taken on board the train and carried to Newcastle where medical aid was summoned. Mr. Sears was brought home yesterday afternoon. In his fall he struck his side on the coupling pin but fortunately escaped without broken bones. He will probably be around all right within a week or so.—Times.
