

LOCAL NEWS.

THE WEATHER.—The extreme cold which visited this province last week did not forget Kent County. On Thursday morning the thermometer registered 20° below zero. It was followed by a silver thaw Saturday.

OYSTER PROTECTION.—A. E. Kemp, oyster expert, who has been working in New Brunswick all year, has returned to Ottawa. He hopes by care and protection that the depleted beds in the maritime provinces will be replenished.

KENT COUNTY CONTRACTORS.—Messrs. George and John Robertson, formerly hotel keepers at Kingston, Kent county have just completed two contracts for the Dominion Government. One of these was a wharf, 1,430 in length at Tracadie, at a cost of about \$5,000. The other was a wharf at Campbellton, costing about \$4,000. The structures were completed to the satisfaction of Mr. J. Hagan, representing the department of Public Works.—World.

SMELT SHIPMENTS.—The smelt catch continues good, the weather is all that can be desired, and all the shippers have to complain of is the scarcity of refrigerators. Last week seventy tons of smelts were shipped from Richibucto for Boston and New York. Last Friday twenty-eight tons were shipped from Buctouche over the B. & M. Railway. Several smaller consignments were shipped from Buctouche and Cocagne during the week. The catch up to the present time this season is fully three times larger than it was during the same time last year.

SABBATH SCHOOL MEETING.—The first meeting of the Parish Association in connection with the N. B. Sabbath School Association, was held in the Presbyterian church of Richibucto on the 14th inst. R. Beers, Esq., President, was in the chair. After a short time had been spent in devotional exercises, an address was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Stevens of Harcourt, on the needs of the Sabbath School. Five minute speeches were delivered by Messrs. Pine and Short, and Revs. J. S. Allen and W. Hamilton. This was followed by a spirited and forcible address by Rev. A. Lucas, field-secretary of the Association. The time and place of the next meeting was left to the executive.

MARRIED IN BOSTON.—A quiet wedding took place at Hotel Dexter, on the evening of the 12th inst. The contracting parties were Mr. Robert S. McLelland, formerly of Galloway, Kent Co., and Miss Minnie R., youngest daughter of Mr. Andrew Anderson of Little River, Kent Co. The bride was beautifully attired in cream colored nun's veiling, and looked very pretty. The bridesmaid, Miss Lucinda Johnson, appeared charming in a dress of white nun's veiling. The groom was ably supported by Mr. R. D. Anderson, brother of the bride. The ceremony was performed by Rev. W. W. Ramsay, D. D., in the presence of a large number of invited guests. After the reception, refreshments were served, when the company departed wishing the happy couple happiness and success. The bride was the recipient of a number of valuable presents. The happy couple have taken up their residence at No. 2 Hotel Dexter, in a nicely furnished apartment.

DEATHS.—At Molus River, on the 27th November last, after a lingering illness, William Barnes died in the 72nd year of his age. Deceased was a brother of Mrs. John Taylor, of Kingston.

At Hillside Falls, Halifax, on Thursday, the 14th inst., Miss Margaret McLeod, daughter of the late William McLeod, of Richibucto, and sister of Mr. Geo. McLeod, died of pneumonia, after an illness of only three days. Deceased was 64 years of age. A special train ran to Kent Junction Sunday morning, and brought the body to Richibucto where the funeral took place Sunday afternoon. The body was buried in the Kingston burying ground.

Patrick Burke, one of Kingston's oldest and most respected citizens, died very suddenly at his residence there last Saturday morning. He had not been feeling very well for a few days before his death, and complained of a pain in his stomach. On Saturday morning he seemed very weak, and before medical help could be summoned he was dead. The doctors attribute his sudden death to heart trouble. He was 72 years of age. His remains were buried in the R. C. burying ground, at Kingston, Tuesday. Rev. Fr. LeBlanc conducted the funeral services. The pall bearers were Messrs. John McLucy, Jonathan Foster, Wm. Brittain, Wm. Brait, John Cameron, and Alex. Fraser. The schools and shops were closed during the forenoon.

At Kouchibouguac, last Saturday morning, Lottie J., daughter of Mr. Alfred B. Weldon, died after a few hours illness, aged 6 years and 2 months.

—News reached Chatham yesterday of the safe arrival of Mr. Hutchinson's barque Armenia, which left this port on the 26th ult., and arrived at Waterford, Ireland, on Tuesday—making the passage in sixteen days. Mr. Hutchinson declined to pay the high winter-rate premium on vessel and cargo demanded by the insurance companies and thus saved about \$1,500 on that item alone.—Miramichi Advance.

—In the case of Chisholm and others vs. Kennedy F. Burns, decided by Judge Fraser in the Equity Court at Fredericton on Friday, the final decree declares Chisholm a partner with Burns in the construction of the Caraqueg railway, and as such entitled to an account by Burns of all moneys received in subsidies from both federal and provincial governments, and from the sale of bonds of the Caraqueg road. Chisholm is dead, and the heirs have carried on the suit which he commenced.

—The store in Newcastle owned by Mr. Michael Bannon was somewhat damaged by fire on Thursday forenoon. The fire caught between the ceiling and the second floor, and as it was feared that it might have extended to the walls of the building, the alarm was given, and soon two streams of water were poured through the upstairs window of the building. The stock below was quickly removed to Morrissey's warehouses. The fire, however, was soon extinguished, but not before considerable damage had been done by both water and fire.

—At the annual meeting of Branch 130, C. M. B. A., Bthhurst, held in their hall in the 5th inst., the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: J. P. Burns, chancellor; Wm. R. Walsh, president; Richard Sutton, 1st vice-president; Henry White, 2nd vice-president; W. J. LaPlante, recording secretary; F. J. Mullins, assistant recording secretary; Jas. Power, treasurer; Joseph Burke, marshal; Ferd. Blanchard, guard. Thomas Salter, Edward Hall, A. A. Melvin, James Howell, Edward Daly, trustees. Jas. P. Burns, delegate to grand council; J. P. Burns, alternate.

—Barque Alexander Black, at Philadelphia from Rio Janeiro, reports having the shot of both Admiral Mello's insurgents and the government forces imbedded in masts and her wire rigging torn by the flying missiles. Capt. Buck reports when he was ready to leave, Capt. Lang, of the British gunboat Sirius declined to convey him to sea, for fear, he said, that the drunken government or insurgent gunners might fire on the the barque and get the British government into international difficulties. He was finally towed out by a Liverpool tug for twenty-five pounds. The barque Alexander Black hails from Dorchester.

—How Thos. McNutt, of Tay Mills, York Co., has come into possession of \$3,561.68 is told in the Fredericton Farmer. Twenty one years ago Thomas's brother, Samuel, went west in search of fortune. He became a miner in British Columbia, and amassed between \$3,000 and \$4,000. In 1883 he became insane, and was persuaded to place his money in the provincial savings bank. He was soon after drowned. His heirs were not discovered for a long time. Mr. Wesley Vanwart of Fredericton, acting for Thomas McNutt, finally worked up the case, proved his client's claim, and last week received the sum mentioned from Mr. F. B. Gregory, of Victoria, B. C., who had been appointed administrator of the estate.

—Bass fishing on the Northwest Miramichi is exceptionally good just now, said a prominent gentleman from that part of Northumberland county to a Sun reporter last evening. Smelt fishing above Middle Island has been very properly prohibited by the minister of marine and fisheries, because it was destroying an enormous amount of young bass. Some people are making big money out of their catches of bass. Last week one man made from \$130 to \$150; another man in one night took \$70 worth, and a man and his son got \$113 for their night's catch. Many folk are making in one night from \$20 to \$40 or \$50. The price has dropped from 10 to 7 cents, but will most likely go up again as soon as the stock on hand in the States, caught early in the season by hooks, is all marketed.—Sun.
