He became a miner in British Columbia, and amassed between \$3,000 and \$4,000. In 1883 he became insane, and was persuaded to place his money in the provincial savings bank. He was soon after drowned. His heirs were not discovered for a long time. Mr. Wesley Vanwart of Fredericton, acting for Thomas McNutt, finally worked up the case, proved his client's claim, and last week received the sum mentioned from Mr. F. B. Gregory, of Victoria, B. C., who had been appointed administrator of the estate.

-Bass fishing on the Northwest Miramichi is exceptionally good just now, said a prominent gentleman from that part of Northumberland county to a Sun reporter last evening. Smelt fishing above Middle Island has been very properly prohibited by the minister of marine and fisheries, because it was destroying an enormous amount of young bass. Some people are making big money out of their catches of bass. Last week one man made from \$130 to \$150; another man in one night took \$70 worth, and a man and his son got \$113 for their night's catch. Many folk are making in one night from \$20 to \$40 or \$50. The price has dropped from 10 to 7 cents, but will most likely go up again as soon as the stock on hand in the States, caught early in the season by hooks, is all marketed. -Sun.
