ROBBERY AT BUCTOUCHE .--- On Friday

night last, the store of Mr. J. D. Irving in Buctouche, was broken into and a quantity of goods stolen. The guilty parties entered the store through a broken pane of glass. Wm Gould, who was concerned in a robbery in Kingston some time ago, and Jude Savoy of Black River, were suspected of having committed the offence and arrested. Gould admitted his guilt and claimed that Savoy assisted him. Savoy protested his innocence. His preliminiary hearing took place before Stipendiary John P. Legere at Buctouche, Tuesday. Some of the stolen goods were recovered.

The Price of a Lynching.

The sealed verdict returned at New Orleans in the Abbagnette case was in favor of the plaintiff for \$5,000. 'The original suit was for \$30,000-\$10,000 for punitive damages, \$10,000 the amount which the deceased would probably have earned during the balance of his life and \$10,000 for his fright and suffering before and while being lynched. The first two amounts were knocked out by the charge of Judge Boarman ; the third amount was cut down to \$5,000 in the discretion lodged in the jury. There are six more cases, and they will be tried in succession, beginning on the 18th. Similar verdicts will probably be rendered in each case, as the same jury will try each case. There will be no appeal from the verdict.




