Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that putteth thy bottle to him, and maketh him drunken also.—Habakuk II, 15.

These are the words of the Almighty God, and we must believe them or not believe them. If we believe them, we will surely act by them; but if we do not believe them, we must take the consequences.

On the evening of Wednesday, 8th of Nov., the Richibucto Division, No. 42, S. of T., in its regular session, passed the following resolution:—"Richibucto Division, No. 42, S. of T., on motion, resolved that a committee be appointed from this Division, to be composed of Sisters, to wait on the clergymen of the parish of Richibucto to ask or request the members of their congregations, from their pulpits or otherwise, not to sign petitions asking the Municipal Council for license to sell spirituous liquors during the incoming municipal year."

The following day, Nov. 9th, at a special meeting of the Richibucto Branch of the W. C. T. U., it was decided to supplement the above resolution by one from their branch. Accordingly the following resolution was passed:—"Richibucto, Nov. 9th, 1893. At a meeting of the Richibucto Branch of the Women's Christian Temperance Union it was unanimously resolved to cooperate with the committee of Richibucto Division, No. 42, of the Sons of Temperance, in their efforts to prevent the electors of the parish of Richibucto signing the petitions to the County Council of Kent for liquor licenses for the coming year."

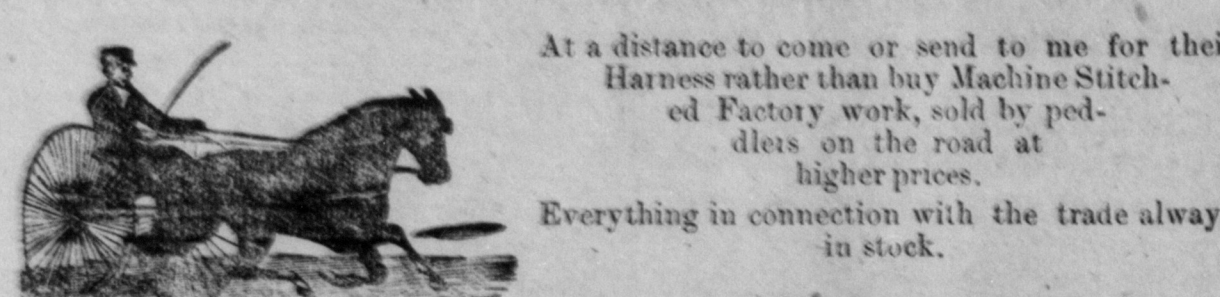
