APPOINTMENT.—August Leere, ex M. P. P., to be sheriff of Kent in the place of Mr. Wm. Wheten, who has been retired, not being able to get the necessary bonds.

REAPPOINTED.—Mr. C. C. Carlyle, Dominion Immigration agent for Newfoundland, has been reappointed for another year. He writes that prospects are good for sending a large number of immigrants to Canada in the spring.

REMOVED TO BASS RIVER.—Mr. James Brown is taking the machinery out of his mill on Sawdust Wharf. It will be removed to Bass River and set up in the same place it stood last winter to cut a quantity of hard wood lumber, which Mr. Brown has on hand there.

PRICE WEBBER AGAIN.—Price Webber and his company are again on the road, with entirely new scenery in place of that destroyed by the Truro fire some time ago. He also announces a new set of plays. He is now playing in Pictou and will visit Richibucto on or about Dec. 5th, to stay five nights.

WAR AGAINST BAR ROOMS.—An effort is being made by the members of the W. C. T. U., and the Division in this town to induce the electors to refrain from signing petitions for license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this parish. They are entering on their crusade with great vigor and promise to make a lively fight against the granting of licenses.

MARRIED.—In Chicago, Ill., Oct. 25th, 1893, in the New England Congregational Church, by the Rev. C. Fremont Roper, of Concord, New Hampshire, Mr. Edgar D. Eastman, of Concord, N. H., and Maud R. Robertson, of Boston, Mass. Miss Robertson is a sister of Mr. Geo. W. Robertson, of Richibucto. Mr. Eastman has had charge of the Annesbury Carriage Exhibit at the World's Fair. The newly wedded pair will remain in Chicago for a short time.

INJURED IN THE WOODS.—A young man named Frank White, whose home is in Cocagne, was brought to Moncton Saturday morning from Bangor, Me., where he sustained very severe injuries while working in the woods. The young man's injuries were in the back and he had to be removed from the parlor car on a stretcher. His limbs were completely paralyzed and he was unable to talk. He was in charge of his two brothers, who went up to bring him home. He received his injuries about a month ago by a tree falling on him. He was taken through to Cocagne on the afternoon train.—Times.

BODY RECOVERED.—The body of Patrick Cadigan, of St. Anne, was brought home on Wednesday of last week, and buried in the R. C. burying ground at St. Anne. Deceased met his death at Debert River, N. S., on Oct. 25th. He was engaged in stream driving. At a point in the river a jam occurred and he went out in it to make a break, but unfortunately slipped through and was drowned. The water was running with great force and it was not until last week that the body was recovered, six miles below the place where the accident occurred. He was 23 years of age.

AGAIN POSTPONED.—The hearing in the case of John M. Vantour charged with stealing and carrying away a number of articles levied on by Sheriff Wheten, at Acadiaville, was again called off before Justice John Hutchinson at Buctouche Friday and again postponed for another week. It appears that a witness required for the prosecution cannot be found, and the Justice appears to have arrived at the conclusion that the witness was being kept out of the way by the defence. He accordingly adjourned the hearing, and remanded the accused to the County jail without privilege of bail. Messrs. Grant, Richardson and Sayre, Barristers, were in attendance.

DIED IN NEW HAMPSHIRE.—The sad news was received here Saturday of the death of Mr. Clifford Murphy at Greenfield, New Hampshire. Deceased was a son of Mr. Patrick Murphy of South Branch. He went to New Hampshire several years ago, where he secured a good position and has remained there ever since. About three weeks ago he was thrown from a carriage and had his leg broken. Before it had time to heal typhoid fever set in and the result was his death last Saturday. He had many friends in this county by whom he was held in the highest esteem. He was to have been married last week to a young lady of South Branch. He was about 35 years of age. The remains arrived Tuesday. The funeral will take place at South Branch today.

ROWDYISM ON SUNDAY.—Two Kouchebougac men anxious for a fight created a disturbance in town Sunday afternoon. They were pretty well loaded with Richibucto whiskey and for a time the air was filled with profanity. Miss Stewart, sister of Mr. A. J. H. Stewart, of Bathurst, after returning from a walk one evening last week, suddenly took ill. 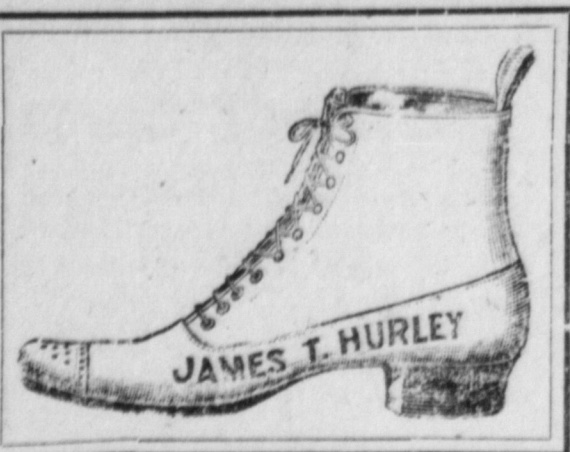
A Frenchman named Octave Francois was killed at Little Metis station on the I. C. R. on Monday of last week. He was going to Point Levis and was waiting for the express. He had evidently fallen asleep, and on hearing the train he ran out and jumped right between the tender and a box car and fell on the rails. He was cut completely in two dying instantaneously. The accident threw the car off the track, delaying the train some time.

The dead body of an infant female child, full grown, was found on a vacant lot near corner of St. George and Vulcan streets, Moncton, last week. The body was much decomposed, and the medical opinion, while to the effect that the child was probably born alive, is not very positive. The conditions of the body showed that death had occurred a week or more ago, but the authorities are quite positive that the body was not placed in the lot where found until Wednesday night. A covered coach was driven past the locality late Wednesday night and there is a supposition that the parties who placed the body in the lot may have been the occupants of the coach.
