Father O'Leary, at Kingsclear, York Co., where she has been living for the past few years. Deceased has suffered for over two years from cancer in the ear, which was the cause of her death. She was 69 years of age. The remains were taken to St. John, where the funeral took place Tuesday.

—The assignment of George Stothard, one of Chatham's leading merchants, is announced. It was brought about by his endorsing for Frank W. Sweeney, who became bankrupt a few weeks ago. There are preferences to the amount of seven thousand dollars. The liabilities are about seventeen thousand dollars. A compromise is hoped for, as Stothard is known in the community as a man of great industry and integrity.

—The death of Ann, daughter of Mr. John McDougall, occurred at Kingston, Saturday morning. Deceased was apparently as well as usual Friday night, and worked at her sewing until ten o'clock, after which she went to bed. Next morning the inmates of the house heard a noise in her room which sounded as if she were choking. When they got to her bedside she was dead. She was 32 years of age. The funeral takes place at Kingston today, (Wednesday.)

—A well-known oyster dealer was heard to remark from present indications an oyster famine is inevitable. The price of oysters has now reached \$4.50, an unprecedented amount at this season of the year and there is every probability of a larger tax. The regular cost is \$2.50 to \$3. This is making the luscious bivalves slightly too expensive for the ordinary man and the supply is greatly limited even at this enormous charge.
