A GENERAL ELECTION. The probability of a general Dominion election in the near future is causing some uneasiness in political circles. The opposition organs profess to believe that the unusual activity now being displayed by members of the Cabinet means an early dissolution of Parliament, and they are warning the Liberals to be prepared. Sir Charles Tupper's visit to Canada has increased this feeling of uneasiness. His movements are being watched with suspicion by his opponents, and it is said the object of his present visit is to feel the political pulse of the country with a view to a dissolution of the House and an appeal to the people. Others again contend that Sir Charles' mission to Canada is solely in connection with the proposed French treaty, and that he is not just now on the best of terms with other members of the Cabinet. They even go so far as to assert that both the Tuppers have threatened to resign in case the government refuses to introduce a bill to ratify the proposed treaty. Color is lent to these rumors by the declaration of the government organ at Halifax, that should these gentlemen "resign for personal reasons" they "would not carry two Maritime Province constituencies with them." It is safe to predict that an election will rot be held until after next session of Parliament. There has been no revision of the electoral lists since the fall of 1891, and it is not at all probable that an election will be held until a revision takes place. Last session was an unusually short one, owing to the absence of the premier in Paris, and there is every prospect of an early session next year. In an interview at Montreal last week, Sir John Thompson said the government proposed to call Parliament as early as possible, at all events as early as last year.
