

LOCAL NEWS.

AT CALLENDAR'S.—George Ameraux and Robert Callendar, shot forty birds on Kouchibouguac Beach last week. They report fowl plentiful. Dr. J. P. McInerney, of St. John, Geo. V. McInerney, George W. Robertson, and Wm. Robertson and M. A. Tirrell, of Boston, are spending this week on the beach.

BASKET SOCIAL AT KINGSTON.—A Basket Social and Musical Entertainment will be held in the Temperance Hall, Kingston, on Thanksgiving evening. A very pleasant time may be expected, as some of the best local talent will take part in the entertainment. Proceeds to go toward the erection of a new public hall.

CANCER REMOVED.—A cancer was removed from the neck of Chas. Curran, of South Branch, by Dr. Ferguson, and Doherty, one day last week. The cancer first appeared in Curran's lip about a year ago. It was then removed by a woman in St. Louis. It soon reappeared however in the glands of the neck, and resulted in the operation last week.

RIFLE MATCH AT MCDUGALL SETTLEMENT.—The "F" troop rifle matches on the P. L. Range on Saturday, resulted as follows:—

Sgt. Maj. Duff, won Harris medal; Corporal Murray, won Emmerson medal; Private Stewart, won Killam medal; Pte. Stewart, won W. & N. medal; Pte. Bateman, won Moncton Lady's cup. The day was fine and good scoring was made generally.

FISHERY BOUNTIES.—The second section of the fishing bounty regulations has been changed so that people who only engage in fishing as a partial occupation cannot claim the bounty. The clause now reads, "No bounty shall be paid upon fish caught in trap nets, pound nets and weirs nor upon the fish caught in gill nets fished by persons who are pursuing other occupations than fishing and who devote more than an hour or two daily to fishing these nets and are not as fishermen steadily engaged in fishing."

BASS FISHERY REGULATIONS.—The new regulations governing the bass fishery in New Brunswick have been gazetted. The close season is from March 1st to October 1st, and at no time shall bass of less than two pounds weight be killed. In the province of New Brunswick bass shall not be fished for, caught or killed by means of any kind of net having meshes of a less size than five inches extension measure, nor by means of seines. The owner of nets used for the purpose of taking bass must take out a license.

MUST HAVE CERTIFIED OFFICERS.—The local shipping authorities at this port have been instructed by the department at Ottawa to notify the owners of steamboats here that they will be held liable to a penalty for running the same without certified masters and mates. This order will not cause the same inconvenience now that it would have caused a few weeks ago. The tug "Victor" went into winter quarters Monday, and the "Calluna" has procured the services of Captain Jas. Gordon for the short time it will run before being laid up for the winter. Mr. Smith's tug has also finished its work for the season. Before next season the present masters of these steamers will have an opportunity to apply for certificates.

THE B. E. I. FERRY SCHEME.—Senator Poirier has recently taken a trip to Prince Edward Island, on business connected with the P. E. I. and Richibucto Ferry Scheme. The Charlottetown Guardian says:—"Judge Landry, of Dorchester, N. B., who was recently called to the bench, and Senator Pascal Poirier, of Shediac, were at the Davies last evening. The senator is the legal adviser of the company which proposes to navigate the Straits of Northumberland between West Point and Richibucto, summer and winter. A representative of the Guardian had a conversation with him last evening, in which he stated that the project is at present in abeyance pending the action of the Dominion government respecting the tunnel. While the survey is being held the company does not wish to prejudice

the tunnel scheme by carrying out theirs. Should the former, however, be set aside, as Senator Poirier believes it will, the company will then be ready to give us the next best thing, viz, a ferry steamer capable of transporting six cars of freight and also passengers across the strait every day in the year. Branch railroads would be required to connect with the main lines from the two points. The surveys made last summer were thoroughly satisfactory. More than that Senator Poirier says observations have been made at the two capes daily during the last three winters and every day the proposed route was sufficiently clear of ice to permit the passage of a good steamer. The hydrography of the strait shows that the heavy ice from Belleisle does not pass south round the North Point of the Island, and that it comes the other way, that is the eastern end of the Island. From West Point across there is nothing but local ice to contend with, and this is easily navigable by suitable steamers. By all means let the company give us the proposed service.

—In the Arson case in the parish of Ainkwick, Northumberland Co., in which James Barry was charged with setting fire to the barn of his brother-in-law, David Neal, there was a hearing before James Robertson, J. P., at Tabisitac and at Oak Point, Thursday. There was no evidence to justify a conviction and the case was dismissed.

—Last week tramps, with whom the county of Kent is infested, entered the R. C. church at Louisburgh, with the intention of destroying the sacred vessels. They forced the door of the church, but happily the vessels were deposited in a neighboring building, and the despoilers were prevented from carrying into effect their sinister design.—Moniteur.

—At Moncton, Sunday night, Nelson Stableford, a brakeman on the I. C. R., had both legs and left arm taken off. The right leg was taken off below the knee, and the left just above it. Stableford was in the act of coupling cars when he stumbled, falling underneath the cars. He is a native of Sussex, and is about 30 years of age. He is married and has one child.

—The Moncton alms house was the scene of a sad suicide Saturday. A man named Tom Holland, aged 33, from Woodstock, N. B., entered the house in August affected with consumption. He gradually grew worse and for the past month he had been confined to his bed. Friday he asked for a razor to shave himself, but was not given it. He repeated the request and another inmate named Gallant went, and procuring one gave it to him. He laid the razor down and asked Gallant to see what time it was. Gallant went, and on his return found the man dead on the bed with his throat cut from ear to ear.

—Mr. Theophilus DesBrisay, Q. C., many years Clerk of the Peace for Gloucester Co., died at his residence in Bathurst, Saturday, after a lingering illness. The deceased was 77 years of age, he came from Prince Edward Island to Bathurst about fifty years ago and practiced law there and was one of the oldest lawyers in the province. He was also Judge of Probates and Clerk of the Common Pleas. Mr. DesBrisay was the father of the late F. Swaine DesBrisay, who died about two months ago, and of Rev. Leacock DesBrisay, of Sorel, P. Q., and also of A. Normand DesBrisay, merchant of Bathurst. The deceased was much respected and his many friends will much regret to hear of his death.

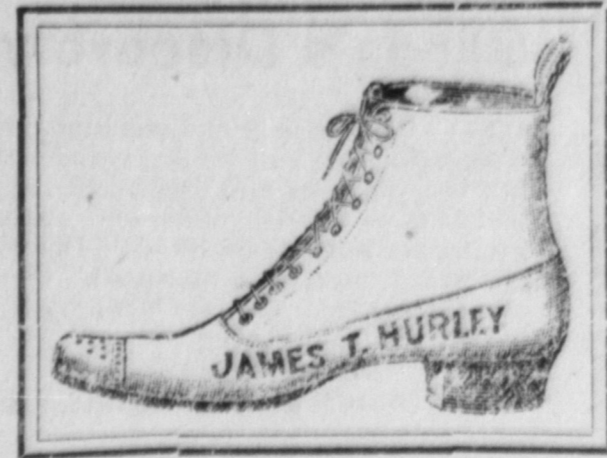
