#### Disaster at Chatham.

CHATHAM, N. B. Oct. 5.—The most serious wreck in this county during the storm is the stranding of the British barque Gatineau, Captain P. Quail, hailing from Greenock, but owned by Messrs. Thomas Dickson & Sons, of Belfast. She was loaded with deals at this port by Mr. Wm. Richards. She went to sea last week, and when off the North Point Pier the captain decided to put back as water was being made fast through her large old-fashioned bow port. She anchored on Wednesday off Escuminac and had Pilot John McEachran on board. The gale which came up on that day increased in violence until Friday when it was deemed best to slip the cable and endeavor to get into port. The vessel was leaking a good deal at the time and drew over 21 feet of water, so that she could not be brought over "the lump" in the prevailing heavy sea and was grounded about half a mile off Huckleberry Island. No one could get on board of her nor could those on board get ashore until Tuesday on account of the sea. Tuesday morning, however, all hands landed, and Captain Quail came to Chatham. Hon. Allan Ritchie had gone down to Huckleberry Island in the interest of the owners but of course could not get on board. But he was with Captain Quail arranging for the protection of the property Tuesday. The vessel is 31 years old, and her back is broken at the main chains. She will, therefore be a total loss. The cargo will probably be saved in a more or less damaged condition.

#### Census Statistics.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—The bulletin issued by the census bureau to-day conveys the information that the number of farmers in Canada decreased greatly between 1881 and 1891. The number of persons who described themselves as farmers and farmers' sons, when the census was taken in 1891, was 735,207, a decrease of 7,206 in the whole Dominion, compared with figures of the 1881 census.

Leaving out farm laborers there were 656,712 farmers and farmers' sons in Canada in 1881, and 649,506 in 1891. In 1881 the number of farmers to each thousand of population in the Dominion was 155, compared with 140 when the last census was taken.

The bulletin also shows that 27,079 were engaged in fishing in 1891, 12,756 in lumbering, 15,195 in mining, 820,000 in industrial occupations, 63,250 in the profession and 186,695 in transportation and mercantile pursuits.

#### The Irish Argonauts.

The history of the gold-hunters of 1849 presents no case for deifying nor yet for canonizing them. They were not even such men as the Puritan colonizers of Massachusetts, or the Catholic colonizers of Maryland. They were not expatriates for an idea. Their object was gold, for which men scheme and betray and steal and murder. The wonder is that there was so little crime among the Argonauts. One must wish, though, that they had cleared themselves of responsibility for the ruin of Marshall and Sutter, the co-partners of the discovery of the gold fields; that "digger ounce" had never been invented, and that "claim jumpers" had not been so numerous and successful. Their chief claim to respect lies in the fact that they founded the state of California. That covers a multitude of sins. Leaping from the cradle to adolescence as through fire, and standing to-day among the most vigorous of our commonwealths, it was a gift to the Union that the donors might well feel proud of.

Among the strong and beneficent elements contributed to the Argonauts by the several nationalities, was that of the Irish race. The Irish Argonauts, generally speaking, went to California to stay. Like the rest, their object was gold; but the sordid motive was purified and ennobled by the better purpose behind that. Taking all the circumstances into account, it can be said of the Irish element, generally that wealth was desired for the comfort it would give kind and kin, whether at home in the old land, or a new home in the Golden State.
