A CALL TO MR. CRAWFORD.—The Presbyterian congregation of Bass and Nicholas Rivers has addressed an unanimous call to Rev. I. W. Crawford, B. A., Mahone Bay, N. S., to become its pastor.

INJURED BY A RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—Mr. C. C. Carlyle was injured by a railway accident which occurred on the Hall Bay Line, Newfoundland, a short time ago. He received a blow in the thigh from a piece of iron. Four others were seriously injured.

HAND CRUSHED.—A man named Cormier whilst engaged threshing in his barn at St. Mary, Monday, had his hand caught in the machine and badly crushed. Drs. LeBlanc and King were summoned and considered amputation necessary.

SMELTS.—Smelts are plentiful and the weather all that could be desired by those engaged in the business. The shippers complain of the scarcity of refrigerator cars. They claim that the I. C. R. has not more than half the number of these cars required.

A COLD BATH.—An Indian who attempted to cross the river on the ice near Richibucto, Saturday, broke through and narrowly escaped drowning. He remained perfectly quiet and held on to the edge of the ice until a boat was sent to his assistance.

PARTRIDGES SEIZED.—The game law officers at St. John, last week, seized at the I. C. R. station, a well filled box of partridges addressed to a St. John dealer. The seizure was made on account of the birds being killed during close season, which makes it criminal to shoot or kill partridge after Dec. 1st. The box was shipped by a Frenchman at Kent junction.

RICHIBUCTO AND P. E. I. FERRY SCHEME.—The Moncton and Prince Edward Island Railway and Ferry Company, have given notice that application will be made to parliament for an act to extend the time for payment of fifteen per cent of the capital stock and for the commencement and completion of the railway and ferry which the Company is authorized to construct.

BOSTON COMEDY COMPANY.—The heavy storm of last week did not prevent a large attendance at the Temperance Hall every evening during the Boston Comedy Company's stay here. On Friday and Saturday evenings the hall was crowded. The play, "British Born," rendered Saturday evening, closed a most successful series. H. Price Webber was, as usual, the life of the company. He is always sure of a warm reception in Richibucto.

TRAINS BLOCKED.—The storm on Tuesday of last week had the effect of blocking the roads and stopping all traffic for a time. The Harcourt mail did not reach Richibucto until Wednesday evening, and the K. N. R. train did not leave until Thursday morning. The Buctouche and Moncton train left Buctouche without a snow-plough and succeeded in getting only as far as Little River. It did not reach Moncton till Friday.

—Miramichi correspondence of Moncton Times:—The bass fishermen are making great catches on the Northwest since the ice made. It is no uncommon thing for a man to make ten, fifteen and twenty dollars a night. In fact, one of our fashionable young ladies went out on last Wednesday night for a short time and came home with five dollars worth. One of our men a few nights ago caught six hundred pounds, which at ten cents a pound would make the nice little sum of sixty dollars, just one night's catch. Many of them have taken thirty, forty and so on of a night. Your correspondent's nearest neighbor went out on the river just about three this morning and he brought up down three hundred and fifty pounds of bass, which will net him thirty-five dollars—not much more than two hours work.

—Smelts are a comparative failure, so far as the fishing off Chatham is concerned, this season, up to date. The nets take three tomocods with every smelt captured, and a sample lot in a packing house on Tuesday, of forty barrels, ten of which were smelts the rest being tomocods, with small proportions of flounders and eusk, was a fair average. To make matters worse we had a heavy fall of snow, for the time of year on Sunday, which submerged the ice and made fishing from it both dangerous and difficult. On Tuesday night 15 ins. of snow fell, which made fishing almost impossible, as the underlying ice is only from one to two inches thick and is wasting away under the slush which now covers it, so that many fishermen will be glad if they save their nets, which cannot now be safely reached.—Auvance.

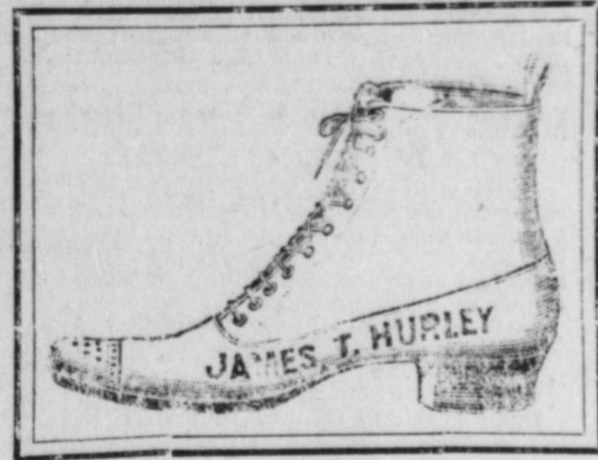

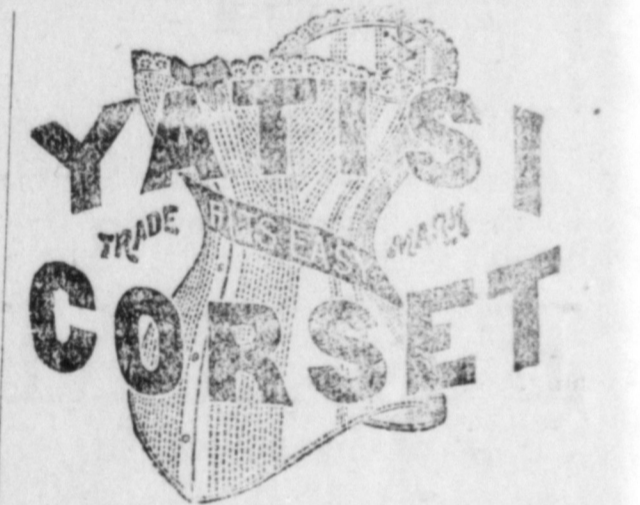
