License Versus No License.

As an effort is being made by the Sons of Temperance, and the Women's Christian Temperance Union to suppress, as much as possible, liquor business in this community it may not be out of place to look into the matter a little and see what this license business really means. In considering this matter, let us try and remove it from the region of abstraction, and deal with it in as concrete a manner as possible.

The principal claim made by the advocates of a license system is this. They say that the money paid by the licensed dealer for his license, goes to the treasury of the county, and is placed to the credit of the parish issuing the license. If no one is licensed to sell spirituous liquors, then just that much money is lost to the credit of the parish, and it has to be made up by direct taxation. The fallacy underlying this statement is the fact that the licensed dealer does not pay the amount of his license fee. He simply collects it. Takes it from the people and hands it over to the County Treasurer.

In order to see who pays this license fee, and what the municipality gains, we must suppose that for the next year, Richibucto continues the license system, for regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors. At the first session of the council, we will suppose there are ten applicants and that the Board fix the fee to be paid for each license at \$20.00. We will suppose these ten applicants are successful. Each gets his license, opens up his place of business. The license advocate exultingly exclaims "Two hundred dollars have gone into the treasury that the county would have to pay if we had no license." Let us see if the county does not, not only pay the two hundred dollars, but if it does not, for the privilege of paying these two hundred dollars, pay at least fifty times as much.

The dealer having secured his license, selects his place of business, gets in his stock of liquor, and stands behind his bar. What is he doing there. Is he making useful material up into clothes? Not he. Is he blowing the bellows, or swinging the blacksmith's hammer, or shoving the carpenter's plane, or making nets for catching snails, or traps for lobsters? Verily he is doing none of these things. Is he working out some plan that will make the people of this parish, of this town, wealthier, happier, wiser? Most assuredly not. He is simply waiting, waiting for the people to come in and hand him back the \$20.00 that he had to pay for his license. Then he says to the people, "You have got me in this position and I must live while I tend this bar, I cannot do anything else. I must have at least one thousand dollars this year to keep my family, and that will only keep them in very moderate circumstances." So the people of this parish during the year step up to the bar and pay over the one thousand dollars. But the license advocate says, "The dealer gives an equivalent for this one thousand dollars." It is true that he gives what he calls an equivalent.

The Liquor Law.
The "Liquor License Act," an abridgment of which appeared in THE REVIEW three weeks ago, virtually placed the liquor traffic in the hands of the people. Without their consent no license can be granted, and the number of licenses issued in any parish or district must bear some proportion to the number of inhabitants. Now, supposing applications for license are accompanied by a certificate from at least one-third of the population resident in the parish of Richibucto how many licenses are the Council entitled to issue for the coming year? With a population of over three thousand and nine hundred and under four thousand inhabitants this matter is easily determined. For such a parish as this the law allows one license to be granted "for each four hundred up to twelve hundred of population, and one for each full thousand beyond twelve hundred of population." Now, suppose the conditions to be complied with, five licenses, and five licenses only, can be granted. At present nine licenses are held by persons within the parish, and it is the duty of the law-abiding citizens to bring such pressure to bear upon the council as shall prevent at least four of these from being renewed in the coming year.

The council, guided by the report of its inspector, must judge as to the qualifications of the applicants, and it is the duty of the inspector to see that the five individuals who may receive licenses observe the conditions under which these are issued. If these persons sell intoxicating liquor to children, keep their bars open at hours other than the law allows, if they permit drunkenness or gambling on their premises, or receive goods in exchange for liquor, they may and ought to be dealt with as the law directs.

It is unreasonable, however, to expect that the inspector can detect every violation of the law; and it is the duty of the citizens to exercise great vigilance, so that, if the traffic cannot at once be suppressed, it may do the least amount of evil possible.

Fellow citizens! you are invested with the power of granting or refusing licenses to traffic in intoxicating liquor. Shall you be faithful to the trust committed into your hands? You have powers which you would do well to exercise. You have a right to demand that the besotted drunkard shall no longer administer to your husband or your wife, your son or your daughter that which has robbed them of their natural affection and changed into infuriated demons those who were once mild and amiable. You have a right to demand that those dens which have blasted the reputation and cut short the career of many a promising and talented youth, changed many a loving husband and father into a degraded, selfish, discontented partner and unnatural parent—you have a right to demand that these dens be swept away. And shall you fail to exercise the power entrusted to you, or exercise it in such a way as to perpetrate existing evils, you may be sowing seeds that shall bear bitter fruits in the future. Act! Act wisely! Act in view of the future! There is we are told "a tide in the affairs of men which taken at the flood leads on to fortune," and should the present opportunity be neglected a similar opportunity to benefit the drunkard and emancipate the county from the terrible curse of intemperance may not soon present itself. Your efforts may not, and will not, be crowned with immediate success, your conduct may be misunderstood and your motives misinterpreted, but be it yours conscious of your integrity of purpose, and nerved with holy ambition, to fight the gigantic evil of intemperance so as ultimately to secure the victory.

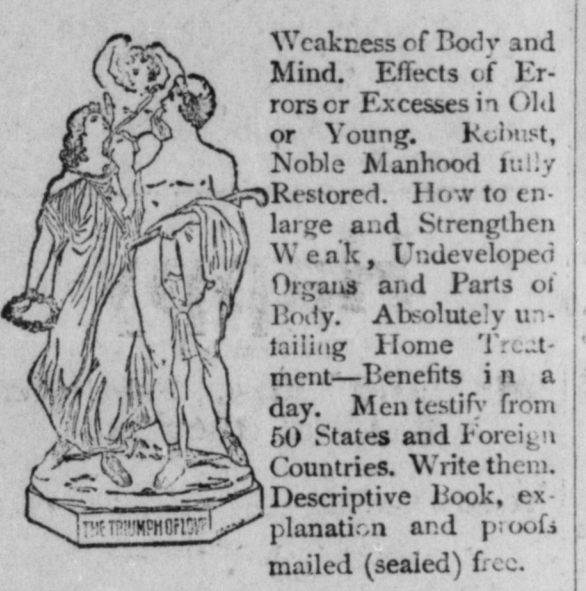
The party at Irvin Daly's was quite a success. Dancing was kept up to the small hours.
