The following is the verdict on the body of Miss Jane Laundry, delivered on Thursday night: That Jane Laundry came to her death by drowning by jumping through a window of the steamer Rustler to avoid being scalded by escaping steam caused by the said steamer running into the Kerr mill wharf and breaking her steam pipe. The said accident was caused by neglect of the captain not taking the necessary precaution and not having a man on the lookout. —A sad drowning accident occurred at Petite Rocher, Gloucester Co., on September 13th, the victim being the nine-year-old son of Joseph H. Comeau, who, against the will of his father, left the shore in a flat-bottom boat to procure a lantern which had been left burning on the deck of his father's schooner. Upon boarding the schooner, which was some distance from the shore, he was seen to fall over into the water by some persons who had been watching his doings. They immediately gave the alarm, but, owing to the intense darkness, no search was made till the morning, when the body was found a short distance from the shore. —The first juvenile offender to come under the recent Industrial School and Reformatory act is Aurele Ouellette, of Madawaska County, aged 12 years. On the night of Sunday, 17th instant, he, in company with his father and another boy named Joseph Ory, aged 15, broke into the store of Alphonse Bertrand, situated in the town of Edmundston, and stole therefrom ten gold rings; the safe was also found to have had three holes drilled into the front, near the lock and combination. Ory turned Queen's evidence, and on the testimony given by him, together with the contradictory statements made by both prisoners and their witnesses in their examination, the jury found the two Ouellette guilty. The father was sentenced to ten years in Dorchester and the son to four years in the reformatory at St. John.


