EDITOR REVIEW.—Not seeing any accounts in the late issues of your paper from your correspondents in Wisconsin, I came to the conclusion I would not let the opportunity of sending you a few notes, go unheeded.

Our city did not escape the financial crash this year in regard to the stringency of the money market. Seymour's bank founded in 1870 by D. E. Seymour, closed its door the latter part of July. For the last three weeks or more, the depositors of the bank, (principally laboring men) have been having an investigation (at this time it is still in progress) relative to the condition of the defunct bank's condition.

Things are beginning to look serious. W. L. Seymour has been arrested twice. He was the cashier. Mr. Maxiner the assistant cashier and teller has also been arrested twice. D. E. Seymour, the senior banker, was arrested yesterday. In each case the different parties gave bonds in the sum of \$5,000. It is said criminal prosecutions are to be pressed. If proof is forthcoming that funds were taken from the bank before and after its closing, and if it can be proved that books were mutilated, the business may end in states prison for one or more concerned.

We had not a good rain shower for about two months till yesterday, when it came as a God-send upon a parched earth, quenching dreadful forest fires that were eating their way into the finest timbers, of Wisconsin, and threatening to destroy many villages and towns. Many people have lost their all, while a large portion of the state has been devastated of its trees and verdure.

Times are not going to be very good out here this year. From all appearances wages will be low. The C. L. & B. Co.'s mills have stopped their wheels, throwing about 500 men out of employment. Their saw-mill is the best in the Northwest, it employs about 300 men. Their planing mill is also a fine institution of its kind.

The Bathurst School Question Again.

Mr. C. N. Skinner has obtained a rule nisi to show cause why certiorari should not issue to quash the assessment for school purposes in Bathurst. The applicant is Wm. R. Johnson, one of the rate-payers. The points on which the rule for certiorari is applied for are:

Section 102 of chapter 65 Consolidated Statutes, and subsequent acts provides as follows: "All schools conducted under the provisions of this chapter shall be non-sectarian."

1. The employment of Sisters of Charity as such and continuing them as teachers. 2. The renting and using of the convent at Bathurst for schools. 3. The Sisters of Charity with the consent of the trustees teaching Roman Catholic catechism and using Roman Catholic prayers during school hours. 4. The trustees allowing the schools to be closed on Roman Catholic holidays not being authorized school holidays.

Sec. 75, chap. 65, Con. Stat., provides that the secretary must forthwith on his appointment give a bond with two sureties.

1. The secretary of these trustees gave no bond. 2. The assessment is excessive.

A portion of the rebel Brazilian fleet continues to blockade the important ports of Santos and according to advices received have made the blockade effective. The rebels have also captured Fort Deserto on the Santa Catharina Island.

Mrs. E. Walker, who has a candy store in Toronto, has received word that an estate in Ireland, valued at \$1,000,000 had been left to her. The property was left by a relative who was a wealthy distiller in Enniskillen, Ireland, and recently died.

At the conference of the Highland Home Rule League held in Glasgow, resolutions were passed strongly demanding Home Rule for Scotland and condemning as grievously wrong that the Crofters should be hunted to Canada so that sheep might take their places.

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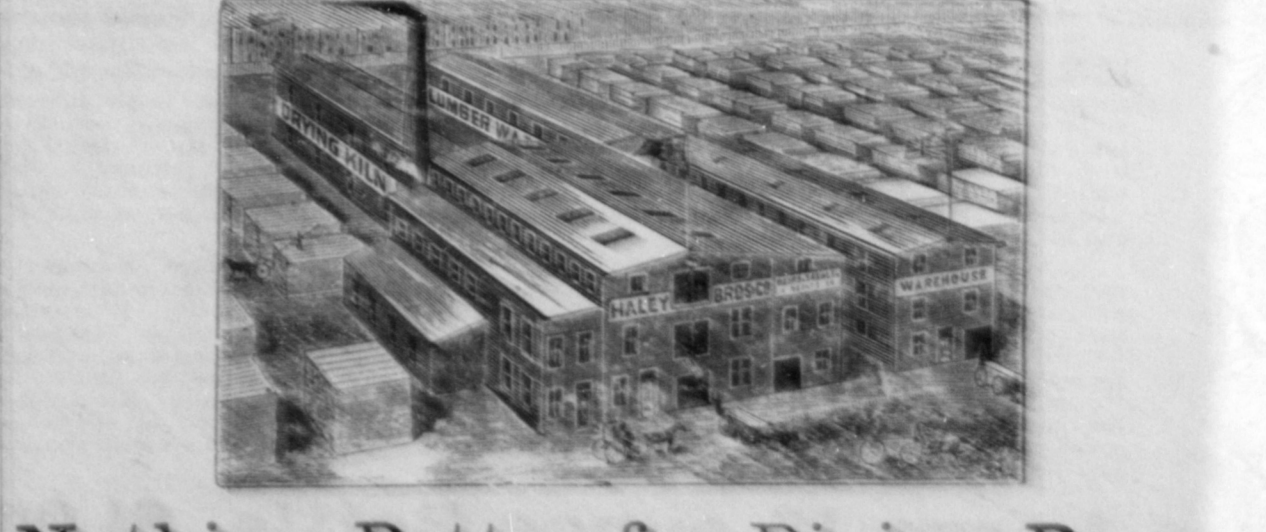
