THE COUNTY COURT JUDGESHIP

Since our last issue no further announcement has been received from Ottawa in reference to the vacancy on the County Court Bench. The delay in filling the position gives reason to hope that the Government will not disregard the claims of Kent. The fact cannot be denied that a very strong public sentiment prevails throughout this County in favor of the promotion of some member of the Kent Bar; and if the appointment again goes to Westmorland, it will be taken as another intimation, added to the number already received from the Dominion Government, that the interests and claims of their friends here are very lightly regarded when they conflict with the grasping demands from the adjoining counties. We do not know that any of the Barristers here are persistently pressing their claims apon the government and pulling the political wires as are the applicants from Westmorland, who are apparently leaving no influence untried; but we believe this fact, instead of preventing a fair consideration of their claims, should on the contrary serve as a recommendation to the Minister of Justice. Neither are we required to "name names," as the St. John Sun suggests. We speak of the appointment from a local strudpoint, and as a matter of justice to the Kent Bar which has always stood well, and still stands well professionally.

There should be some measure of fair play in all such matters. In any legal proceeding when a child of tender years is tendered as a witness, and such child does not, in the opinion of the judge, justice or other presiding officer, understand the nature of an oath, the evidence of such child may be received, though not given upon oath, if, in the opinion of the judge, justice, or other presiding officer, as the case may be, such child is possessed of sufficient intelligence to justify the reception of the evidence and understands the duty of speaking! the truth. But no case shall be decided upon such evidence alone, and such evidence must be correporated by some other material evidence.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 30.—The axe with which Bertha Wheary is supposed to have received her death blow on Wednesday afternoon was found yesterday afternoon under some barrels in the shed of the Wheary house. Word of the find was sent to town this morning and Detective Roberts has gone up to take possession of the weapon. The appearance of the axe is said to indicate that it had recently been washed. There are no blood marks visible to the naked eve upon the blade, but there are said to be some clots on the handle immediately above where it enters the iron. No one has been able to find any blood spots upon the prisoner's person or upon the clothes he had on when Hedley Wheary came home and found his wife murdered, but it is stated to-day that the officers have evidence to show that the prisoner changed his clothes after Hedley left the house and before he returned.
