

LOCAL NEWS.

FIRST PRIZE.—The tub of butter sent from the St. Louis creamery to the Provincial Exhibition at Fredericton was awarded the first prize. No report has yet been received from that sent to the World's Fair, Chicago.

DESERTED THE SHIP.—Four sailors deserted the bark Bessie Markham, as she lay at anchor in the river, a few nights ago. The runaways constructed a raft of fenders and on it managed to reach the south bank. No attempt was made to capture them.

PUBLIC MEETING.—There will be a public meeting held at the Temperance Hall, in Kingston, on Monday evening the 18th inst., at 7 o'clock, for the purpose of selecting trustees and making general arrangements for construction of the proposed new Public Hall.

GONE TO NEWFOUNDLAND.—Mr. J. W. Kennedy, who has for the past year been in the employ of Mr. J. D. Irving, Buctouche, as bookkeeper, left last week for Newfoundland, where he intends putting up a saw mill and going into the lumber business. Mr. Harry Hutchinson takes his place in the employ of Mr. Irving.

A FEARFUL NIGHT.—The seamen on board the wrecked barques Konoma and McLeod put in a terrible time last Sunday night. The sea broke over the vessels with great violence, and the men were obliged to lash themselves to the masts to save themselves from being swept overboard. The cabin of the Konoma was filled with water, and her fore-top-mast and main-top-gallant mast were carried away. When the crew were taken off the vessel Monday night, they were almost perished.

CIRCUIT COURT.—The case of James Babain vs. George Daigle and Maxim Daigle, the only cause tried this circuit, lasted till Saturday. This was an action of trespass brought by plaintiff against defendants for erecting a lobster factory on his lot on the North beach. It appears that the early grantees of the beach, about twenty-five years ago, divided it up by casting lots. Plaintiff claimed that this division was intended to be final, and he accordingly rested his case on a deed from the parties who drew lot No. 1. Defendants claimed there had never been any final division of the beach and claimed an undivided right in lot No. 1 as lessees of another of the original grantees. The jury rendered a verdict of \$10 in favor of plaintiff. C. J. Sayre for plaintiff, Geo. V. McInerney and J. D. Phinney for defendants. A motion for trial was made in the next case on the docket, John W. Harnett vs. Roderick McDonald. His Honor stated that it was necessary for him to be in Fredericton, at the opening of the October term of the Supreme Court, Tuesday, and therefore he was unable to try the cause. He however, made an order making it the first cause on the docket of the March circuit. Court then adjourned sine die.

THE STORM.—The storm which began last Friday has been the most severe that has visited the North Shore for a number of years. Saturday night and Sunday it was at its height. The wind blew a gale and the tide rose very high. The wharves were flooded and nearly everything loose was swept off them. Some of the timbers of the public wharf were loosened and the wharf was much damaged. A raft of deals belonging to Messrs. J. & T. Jardine, lying alongside, was broken in two and driven ashore near the Beaches Hotel. Bark Bessie Markham and the Norwegian bark Luannal, lying at anchor in the river, broke away from their anchorage and were driven on the north bank near the ballast heap, where they now lie. The Bessie was light, and was driven pretty well up on the bank. Captain Gaudet's schooner the Scud was driven high and dry on the bank near the Episcopal church. Schooner Morning Star, loaded with lumber, was carried up into the Irving field, near McBeath's Point. Three barks, the MacLeod, belonging to Mr. George K. McLeod, and the Valona and Konoma, belonging to Messrs. Jardine, were anchored outside the harbor. The Valona was driven high and dry on the South Beach. The MacLeod and Konoma were loaded. They are both on the reef. The latter is a total wreck. The seamen say they never before experienced so heavy a sea. A number of fishing boats were driven ashore, and nearly all the booms in the river were broken and the logs scattered. The shores are strewn with logs, deals and wreckage. Fences, trees and crops are leveled in many places. The damage is heavy. Reports from the southern part of the county indicate that the freshet has caused a vast amount of damage to milling property. At Notre Dame, Cocagne, Bowen Smith's mill dam was broken and the logs in the pond let out. Some injury was also done to the mill; the saw dust chain was torn to pieces and the deal wash torn out. The damage done will amount to about \$3,000 or \$4,000. Mr. E. J. Smith's rafting boom at the same place was also broken and \$1,000 damage done. Faulkner's mill also suffered in the same manner, and other mill dams throughout the county are, it is expected, likewise broken. It is reported that the big bridge at Cocagne was partially carried away and traffic over it suspended.

—Young Lemuel Dickson, who was shot by his companion, John McCully at Chatham, died Thursday. An inquest was held by coroner Dr. John S. Benson next day. Rev. Neil McKay deposed that deceased told him McCully did not mean to harm him. Young McCully's statement was also taken by the coroner. He said he believed that only an empty cartridge was in the pistol which he first aimed at his own head and snapped, then pointing it at Dickson and telling him he was going to shoot him and when he pulled the trigger he was much surprised that the cartridge exploded. A post mortem showed that the ball had penetrated the matter of the brain. The verdict was that death was caused by a pistol shot fired by John McCully, who at the time believed the pistol contained only an empty cartridge and was therefore practically one of accidental death.

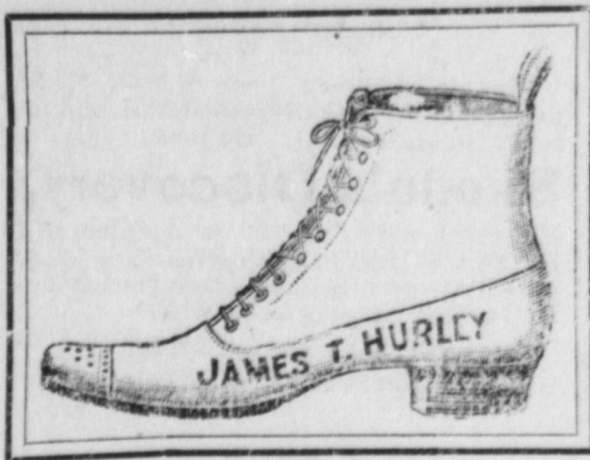

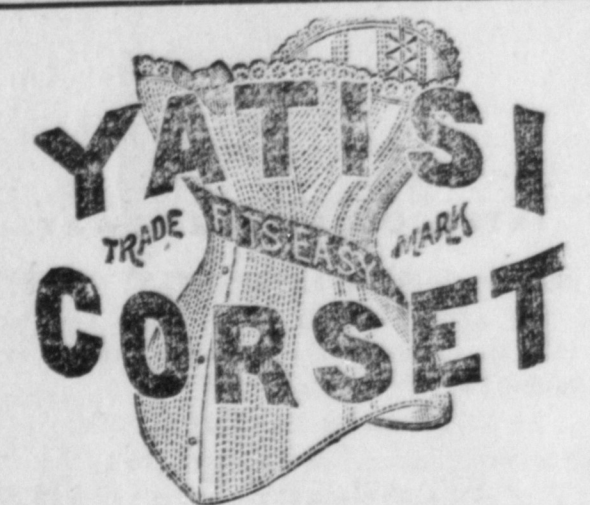
