NUGGETS.

—The bark Gateau is ashore near Fox Island, Miramichi.

—Mrs. A. J. H. Stewart of Bathurst, is visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Morrison.

—Mr. Thos. Murray lost a quantity of hemlock bark, piled on the public wharf. It was washed away by the storm.

—Messrs. George McLeod and Vroom, of the firm of Vroom and Arnold, Marine Insurance agents, arrived Tuesday.

—Rev. John Robertson and Mrs. Robertson of Black River, Northumberland Co., paid Rev. Wm. Hamilton a visit last week.

—The Norwegian bark Pantecarto, Liverpool, Eng., in ballast, bound for Miramichi, five weeks out, ran ashore just below Green Cove, C.B., early Sunday morning during the storm and is a total wreck. The captain and crew got ashore with difficulty. The wreck is fast breaking up; her bottom is gone and the deck is broken considerably with a heavy surf still running. The ship is listed towards shore with both masts broken. Had she gone a cable length either side on the reefs that project at those points the crew could not have been saved.

FOUND DROWNED.—The body of an unknown man was washed ashore on the South Beach by the storm. Dr. Bourque was notified, and on Wednesday he impounded a coroner's jury and proceeded to the beach where an inquest was held. The flesh was off the face, hands and head of the dead man, and nothing was found in his pockets or on his person to lead to his identification. He was probably a man about six feet in height and 190 lbs weight. On the body was a homespun shirt and suit and over these an oil suit. A nickel watch was found in his pocket with a brass chain and glass charm attached. Around his neck was a scapular. The coroner is of opinion that the body has been in the water several weeks. It is thought to be the body of a Gloucester county fisherman. The jury was composed of Messrs. Wm. Long, John Curwin, D. Richard, Joseph Michaud, S. Gaudet, Paul Logoff and James Fitzpatrick. Their verdict was that deceased came to his death by drowning. The body was brought to Richibucto and buried in the Roman Catholic burying ground, Wednesday.

The tenth annual convention of the New Brunswick Provincial Sunday-school Association will be held in St. Stephen, beginning Wednesday evening, October 11th and continuing throughout the 12th and 13th. A change in date has been made, bringing the convention a week earlier than was at first intended, in order to secure the services of B. F. Jacob, Esq., the leading Sunday-school worker of the world. Referring to Mr. Jacob, the St. John Sun of Sept. 25th says:

"The name of B. F. Jacob is a household word with Sunday-school workers, both on this continent and that of Europe. He was the chief means of bringing about the international lesson system more than twenty years ago. For some years he has been chairman of the international executive committee, and is now president of the World's Sunday-school Convention. He is one of the most inspiring platform speakers and a man of sterling Christian life. His visit will induce a large attendance of Sunday-school workers from the whole province."

With President Jacob in attendance and the programme committee arranging for a great "feast of good things," the opportunity for profit afforded by the coming convention may be recorded among the privileges of a life-time. The profit will be in creating in the worker a thirst for a deeper knowledge of the Word, a broader understanding of the methods of using it, and a rekindled zeal for the cause that means so much for the moral elevation of the world.

GENERAL NEWS.

Steamer advices from Japan state that the floods at Gifu, Japan, swept away 682 houses. Fourteen thousand houses were flooded. 338 persons perished and 3620 people were rendered homeless. The great Buddhist Temple at Tokio was destroyed by fire, Sept 7. It was originally founded in 1688, but burned in 1872, and rebuilt in 1880.

A special from Meridian, Miss., says the whitecap insurrection in Central Mississippi has assumed such formidable proportions that it will become an armed rebellion unless the organization is speedily broken up. A reign of terror prevails in nearly every county in that section and outrages by the outlaws are of nightly occurrence.

A despatch from Fort Victoria, B.C., says that preparations for resistance continue there in view of the expected attack upon the part of the Mataheles. The natives report that the young warriors of the Mataheles have broken away from the control of King Lobongula, and that the warriors are preparing for a big fight. The authorities at Fort Salisbury have requisitioned all the horses and saddlery it is possible to secure for active service.

A despatch from Crystal Falls states that Mansfield mine, where the cave in occurred burying 60 men, is seven miles east of that village, on the Menominee range.

The main shaft of the mine extends under Michigamew river, and when the cave in occurred it turned the stream into the mine, flooding it almost instantly. Sixty men were working in the mine when the disaster occurred, and of this number 15 made their escape. It is not thought possible that any of the remaining 45 men can be rescued alive.

Steamer Hogarth, from Santos, Brazil, reports that on Sept. 2 the Italian steamer Vincenzo Flori, from Genoa Aug. 24, loaded with immigrants, was lying outside Santos harbor in a helpless condition with cholera among the passengers. The vessel had been refused admission to Brazilian ports on account of the plague on board. There were said to be from twenty to thirty deaths on the steamer daily and the bodies of the victims, together with the clothing and bedding, were thrown overboard and washed ashore near Santos. The steamer evidently was without medical aid or supplies and had not enough provisions to proceed further.

A special despatch from Bangkok, says that the situation growing out of the Franco-Siamese dispute is again strained, owing to the dictatorial attitude of M. de Villers, French special envoy. The despatch adds that in reply to a request from the Siamese minister of foreign affairs that he would make in writing whatever modification he had to suggest in the draft of the convention submitted to him by Siam. M. de Villers sent a curt and insolent note that greatly offended the Siamese government. M. de Villers is evidently determined to force further concessions from the Siamese. He is attempting to make Siam answerable for delays in negotiations which, as a matter of fact, are due entirely to his persistent concealment of France's intentions.

This office has received a copy of a pamphlet entitled "Minnesota: A Brief Sketch of Its History, Resources and Advantages," issued by authority of the Minnesota Board of World's Fair Managers. It is a bit of World's Fair literature that deserves more than a passing notice, as it is most attractively illustrated and its letter press is exceedingly interesting and highly flattering to the North Star State.

The first page of cover is printed in seven colors and presents a unique and attractive picture. The conspicuous figure is an Indian maiden, standing in the foreground, her feet resting on the beautiful moose skin flower, which has been adopted as the state flower of Minnesota. She is in a wheat field, a part of the grain having been out, and a binder is shown at rest at the edge of the uncut portion. In the distance are the farm buildings surrounded by groves of trees. Above all is the blue tinted sky, shining out from which high up in the north is a large star resplendent and bright, indicating the North Star state.

The illustrations include Minnehaha Falls, prominent public buildings, some of the grand lakes of the state, quarries, farm scenes, portraits of all the governors and of the Board of World's Fair Managers and Woman's Auxiliary Board. An excellent map of the state is found within the covers. The letter press is admirably handled and begins with a sketch reciting the most prominent events in the state's history. This is followed by a general description of the material state, the principal natural features, area, rivers, lakes, soil, climate, productions, with statistics of industries, including wheat, corn, flax, fruits, vegetables, live stock, dairying, lumbering, mining, manufacturing, with prices and profits. The social state is covered, showing character of people, population, wealth and taxation, debt, education, etc. The last fifty pages cover a brief description of each of the eighty counties of the state, showing area, surface features, extent of land under cultivation, character of soil, productions, extent of land for sale, with range of prices, and population. It makes out a strong showing for Minnesota as a state having all the best elements that make happy homes and prosperous people. We shall be mistaken if the publication does not prove a successful immigration agent.
