SCHOOL REGULATIONS AMENDED.—The Board of Education has ordered the following changes in school regulations:

Reg. 17 .- List of prescribed text books : Health Readers, No. 1 and 2 (New Bruns wick Series, J & A. McMillan, St. John), in place of Palmer's Temperance Teachings

[Note-Palmer's Temperance Teachings may continue to be used at the option of trustees and teachers until July 1st, 1894.] Reg. 20, Sec. 6, amended so that the first sentence of the section shall read :

"6, Length of Daily Session-The term 'school hours' shall mean and include all close of the school for the day; but the Retail. the time between the opening and the rs of teaching shall not exceed six each exclusive of at least an hour allowed at noom for recreation.

Reg 22.—The following sentence is to be omitted from Regulation 22 .- "Any other prayer may be used by permission of the trustees."

Stenographer Risteen, who had been reading over part of the day's proceedings to the court, a few minutes after leaving the room, hear I an unusual sound. Rushing on the floor, unconscious. Medical aid was summoned, and it was found that one side of the body was paralyzed. He was removed to his home in Fredericton, where he lies in a critical condition.

-Hibernia Settlement, Queens Co., was thrown into wild excitement over a shooting case which is likely to cause the author of it to be put on his trial for murder. On Sunday afternoon shortly after dinner hour two lads named Brown, 12 and 14 years of age respectively, took a gun from home and went into the words in search of game. They were joined by another lad named Rathburne. The latter espied a large piece of gum on a spruce tree and remarked to his companions that he would climb the tree and get it. "If you do," shouted one of the Browns, "I'll shoot you." Nothing daunted by the threat Rathburne started to climb the tree and while he was ascending Brown levelled the gun at him and fired the contents, a load of partridge shot into Rathburne's body. The latter fell to the ground and when found shortly afterwards he was lying in a pool of blood. The Browns fled, leaving their victim to die. After suffering excruciating pain about 12 hours Rath burne died. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the alleged murderer.


