THE BUCTOUCHE & MONCTON RAILWAY.—Work is progressing on the B. & M. Railway and it is expected that the road will be in thorough repair by the first of January next.

—Sumner Co., of Moncton, are sending their schooner, the Walter Sumner, Capt. Pye, to Barbados with an experimental cargo, consisting of 113,000 feet of pine boards, 655 bushels of potatoes and 386 bushels oats. If the shipment proves a success this firm, who own a fleet of schooners of their own, will probably engage quite extensively in the West India trade.

—Chief Justice Allen, who was holding court at St. Andrews on Tuesday of last week, was attacked with a paralytic stroke, after retiring to his room in the evening. Stenographer Bisteen, who had been reading over part of the day's proceedings to the court, a few minutes after leaving the room, heard an unusual sound. Rushing into the room, he found the judge lying on the floor, unconscious. Medical aid was summoned, and it was found that one side of the body was paralyzed. He was removed to his home in Fredericton, where he lies in a critical condition.

—Hibernia Settlement, Queens Co., was thrown into wild excitement over a shooting case which is likely to cause the author of it to be put on his trial for murder. On Sunday afternoon shortly after dinner hour two lads named Brown, 12 and 14 years of age respectively, took a gun from home and went into the woods in search of game. They were joined by another lad named Rathburne. The latter espied a large piece of gum on a spruce tree and remarked to his companions that he would climb the tree and get it. "If you do," shouted one of the Browns, "I'll shoot you." Nothing daunted by the threat Rathburne started to climb the tree and while he was ascending Brown levelled the gun at him and fired the contents, a load of partridge shot into Rathburne's body. The latter fell to the ground and when found shortly afterwards he was lying in a pool of blood. The Browns fled, leaving their victim to die. After suffering excruciating pain about 12 hours Rathburne died. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the alleged murderer.

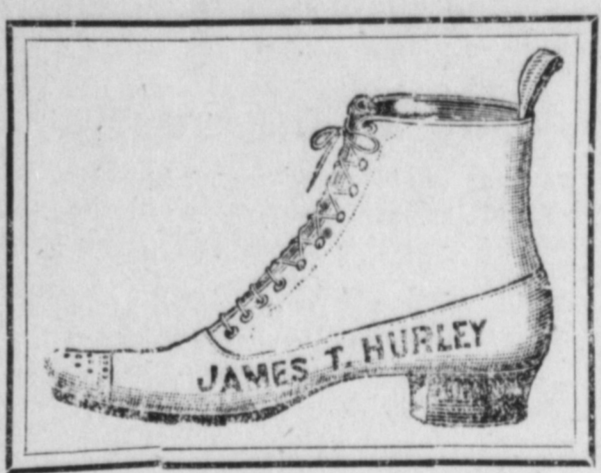
