THE CROWN LAND SALE.

The sale of the lumber lands of the province, under the new regulations, granting licenses for twenty-five years, took place at Fredericton last week. As was to be expected, there was a large gathering of the big lumber operators anxious to secure the monopoly which the long-term leases will give, while the smaller operators were conspicuously absent. In some instances there was sharp competition and the banks and men with long purses ran several of the blocks up to figures, which, if mill owners and lumber merchants are to be believed, are not justified either by the present or prospective condition of the lumber market. A feeling of jealousy and rivalry frequently enters into these public land sales such as is often seen on a smaller scale at the every day public auction, and the bidders with the most money or the largest credit, and too often the least judgment, become the purchasers. 'The Government of course profits by the competition, and whether the lands are really worth the money or not, the revenue is proportionally increased. Towards the close of the sale, the jealous rivals concluded that they had enough of such unbusinesslike competition, and that in their own interests if not in the interests Inerney did not personally seek the posi- con. Having obtained a half hour's delay at the reopening of the sale on Thursday morning, they arranged their difficulties, and, with one exception, none of the remaining blocks brought more than the upset price-eight dollars per square mile. The total amount realized from the sale is not by any means so large as was anticipated from the extension of the leases to twenty-five years and the inference may fairly be drawn that if the term had been ten years, the total revenue derivable from the more frequent sales would very much exceed, if not double the sum now received. Apart from these considerations, it may well be questioned whether it is a correct policy, in the interests of trade, and the general business of the province, and in justice to the men of moderate means, to permit the creation of such a monopoly as the twenty five years leases cause. The effect is to exclude from the lumber business all except the more wealthy operators, or those having a present stake in it. To all others at least, a term of ten years would be much more acceptable, and from a revenue stand-point would have been much more satisfactory. It may safely be predicted, that none of the purchasers of the lands at last week's sale will at the end of twenty-five years take part in another sale. The period is an ordinary business life tmie, and in view of the business reverses and overturns which will undoubtedly take place within it, and the changes which time makes, other men will then probably be found competing for the lands, and managing the properties now controlled by the present operators. Because of the changes which such a long term will necessarily occasion and the possible and probable enhancement in value of the lands and in the interest of the lumber trade generally, we cannot regard the present regulations for long term leases as either prudent or justifiable. - 484 -



STAY ON THE FARM.

Secretary Morton notes the disposition among young men in the United States to abandon the farm and seek employment in the cities, and the gradual growth of towns and cities at the expense of country districts, and proceeds to give some good advice to those who contemplate making a change. He points out to them that they will be the losers in the long run, and reminds them that only about three per cent. of all the merchants escape failure, whereas hardly three per cent. of the farmers fail. Farming is really the safest way of earning a livlihood, and the farmer is the most independent man in the country. Statistics show that agriculture is safer than banking, manufacturing, trading, or any other pursuit, taking all things into account. True, there is a great deal of hard work to be done on a farm, but nothing to compare with the worry. trouble and care in connection with a mercantile business. "There is no farmer of good sense and good health anywhere," Mr. Morton declares, "who cannot make a good living for himself and family, and that is as well as the majority of men are doing in any other pursuit. The man who owns a farm and sticks to it is certain to brothers, or sons who can vote, must use profit by it in the future. There is practically no more land to be added to the area of cultivation. The supply of agricultural products has reached its limit in the United States and must remain stationary, while axe will be laid at the root of the tree the demand will go on increasing every nevertheless.
