

LOCAL NEWS.

ST. LOUIS CREAMERY.—The machinery in the St. Louis Creamery broke down last week and delayed the work for a day or two, but it was soon repaired and in running order again.

LOT IN DISPUTE.—There is a dispute between two Kent County men over one of the lots sold at Fredericton, last week. Mr. Stephen Briggs and Mr. J. D. Irving both claim to have purchased this lot at the upset price.

RAILWAY MEETING.—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Buctouche and Moncton railway took place on Wednesday of last week, at Buctouche. Messrs. R. C. Skinner of St. John, John C. Harris of Moncton, John McKee of Buctouche; Dr. L. G. DeBertram, Messrs. F. J. Merritt, J. F. Anderson and C. C. Barr of New York were elected directors.

CHARGED WITH LARCENY.—The preliminary hearing of Cytile Renaud of Buctouche, charged with stealing \$25.00 from the till of Richard Hebert's hotel, Kingston, was held before Stipendiary Magistrate Richardson, Thursday. Wm. D. Carter appeared for the defence. It was proved to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that Renaud had left Kingston for home in company with Luke McEwen some time before the robbery took place, and the charge was accordingly dismissed.

THE BUCTOUCHE & MONCTON RAILWAY.—Dr. DeBertram of New York, who recently purchased the Buctouche & Moncton Railway for a party of New York capitalists, will leave for Ottawa in a few days. Since the purchase, Dr. DeBertram with an engineer has inspected the road with a view of learning what repairs are most needed, and the present visit to Ottawa is to endeavour to secure the balance of the unpaid subsidy on condition the needed repairs are made.

BUCTOUCHE FIRE BUGS AT WORK AGAIN.—Last Thursday morning about five o'clock, Mr. Anthony Grattan of Buctouche, heard a noise in his new store and went to the door to see what caused it. He saw nothing, however, and returned to his house. When the workmen went to their work in the morning, they found about a pound of powder wrapped up in a newspaper. Cards of matches were placed from the door to the powder, so that the one who touched it off would have time to get away before the explosion occurred.

NEW GAME LAW.—The following provisions of the new game law of last session should be particularly noted at this time: Black duck, wood duck and teal may be shot from 1st September to 1st January. Partridge, woodcock and snipe from 20th September to 1st December. Penalty for shooting these birds before above dates not exceeding \$10 nor less than \$4 for each bird; on default of payment of fine imprisonment in common goal for not more than four or less than two days. Penalty for shooting "on the Sabbath or Lord's day" not exceeding \$50 or less than \$30 for each offence; in default of payment imprisonment in common goal not exceeding ten or less than five days. Penalties to be recovered as provided by act and one-half amount of fine recovered to be paid to the informer.

EQUITY COURT.—An application was made before Judge Hannington, at Moncton, Monday at the instance of J. Sherwood, for an interim injunction against James Johnson to restrain him from selling or disposing of lands in St. Mary in Sherwood's possession, or from bringing an action of ejectment to recover the same. The ground on which the injunction was sought was that the land in question had been conveyed to secure the payment of a certain sum of money by Sherwood, to John and George Coates, and that Johnson had bought with full knowledge of this fact. Defendant denied this and alleged that he had no knowledge of any condition attached to the sale to Coates. The Judge held that he had no discretion but to grant an interim injunction until the case was brought to an issue and the matter tried out before a jury. R. W. Henson for Plaintiff and J. D. WEDDINGS.—Chalmers' church, Richibucto, was the scene of a quiet wedding Tuesday morning when Mr. Wm. E. Forbes and Miss Jennie Jardine, both of Richibucto, were united in marriage by Rev. M. Hamilton. The happy couple at once left on a wedding trip. They were accompanied as far as St. John by Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Storer.

As we go to press a marriage ceremony is taking place in Kingston. Mr. A. J. H. Stewart, of Bathurst, and Miss Belle Morrison, daughter of Mr. A. F. Morrison, of Kingston, are the principals. The ceremony is being performed by Rev. J. S. Allen, assisted by Rev. Wm. Hamilton. The bride is attended by Miss Crawford, of Charlottetown, and Mr. W. A. Mott, of P. P. of Campbellton, supports the groom. After the ceremony a special train will convey the happy couple and a party of friends as far as Kent Junction. From there the newly wedded pair will take the midnight express on a wedding trip to the principal cities of the United States.

—The body of a man was washed ashore at Tague's Brook, Salmon Beach, Gloucester Co., Friday morning. Some letters addressed Francois Cormier, New Richmond, P. Q., and about twenty dollars in cash were found in his pockets. An inquest was held by Coroner Meahan, of Bathurst, and a verdict of "found drowned" was returned.

—The borings in the Northumberland Straits Tunnel survey are now going on. Messrs. Macrae & Co., of Ottawa, having the work in hand. The Robb Engineering Company, of Amherst, are building an iron tower, one hundred feet high, in sections, to be erected in the Straits for use in boring. The work of boring has been much interfered with of late by the high winds that have prevailed, but good progress is made in calm weather.

—A man named David W. Armstrong, whose address is Reading, Mass., advertises for a wife in the Moncton Times. 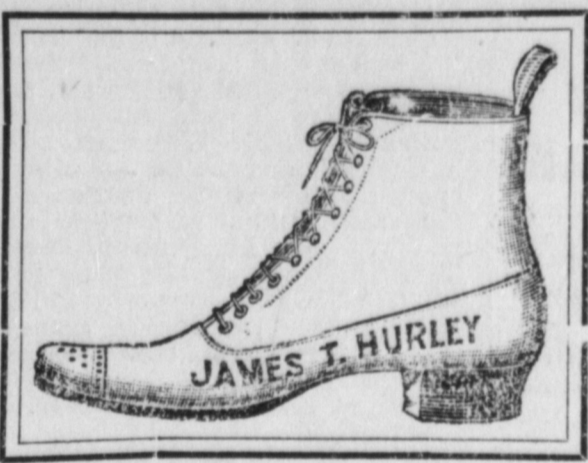
—The lumber merchants returned from Fredericton on Friday, with their pockets empty of cash and full of Crown Land leases. The Miramichi men were the chief bidders at the sale, having failed to agree beforehand on a division of the spoil. Mr. Hutchinson had no land and wanted part of that which had been held by others. He got it by paying big premiums, and made the former holders pay big premiums on their purchases. The Restigouche and Gloucester men agreed among themselves, and bought the lands at the upset price.—World.

—George W. Oulton, of Moncton, N. B. aged about 54, has been stopping at the Hotel Thorndike, Boston. Some time early Friday morning a servant traced escaping gas to his room, where Oulton was found partially unconscious. The servant found the gas turned on and roused Oulton; turned off the gas and opened the windows. About 11 o'clock the smell of gas was again noticed and Oulton found unconscious with the gas turned on. Oulton was removed to the Massachusetts General Hospital. It is stated that he had been on a protracted spree and this is believed to have led to the attempted suicide. He will recover.

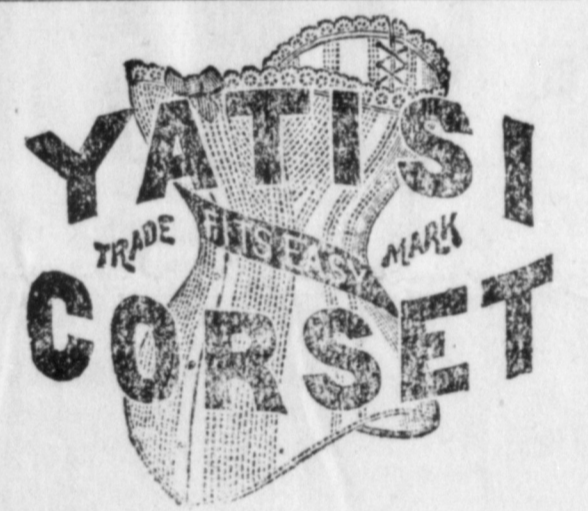
