## LOCAL NEWS.

TEA-MEETING.—The ladies of the Presbyterian Congregation of Mill Branch, held a tea meeting and apron sale at the grove, McWilliam's corner, Wednesday.

THE WEATHER .- The intense heat of last week was followed Sunday and Monday by the heaviest rain storm that has visited us for some time. Last Thursday was the hottest day experienced here for years. At noon the thermometer reached 103° in the shade. On Friday it did not get above 96° in Richibucto, though in Kingston it went up to 100°.

FOREST FIRES. - Forest fires did great damage in the county last week. A fire near Adamsville Station, on the I. C. R, burned a large part of the surrounding district. Three building were destroyed. A quantity of lumber and bark near the station was burned, and it was with great difficulty that the station was saved. The loading platform was destroyed.

SUMMARY EJECTMENT. - An action brought by Marie Maillet to dispossess Theophile LeBlanc of the store and premises now in the latter's possession at Richibucto Village, under the provisions of the Landlord and Tenant act, came up for hearing before Justices Wm. A. Black and James McDougall, Monday. When the case was called, the parties announced that they had reached a settlement.

HEAVY THUNDER STORM .- Buctouche was visited by a very heavy thunder and lightening storm Monday morning. Several telegraph posts on the south side of the river were shattered by the lightening, leaving the wires hanging in a tangled condition. The dwelling house of Mr. Charles Sheridan at Little River, and the new Catholic church at St. Paul, were also struck. The latter was badly shattered.

-A meeting at Campbellton of the stockholders of the Restigouche and Victoria railway company was held Thursday afternoon in Messrs. Murry and McLatchy's office. It was resolved to take immediate steps to have the first fifteen miles surveyed at once.

-New postage stamps of the value of eight cents are being put into circulation. The stamp will be available for the prepayment either of registration fee and postage combined, or postage only. The five cent registration stamp is to be withdrawn when the present supply is ex-

-The Sheriff took possession of John Edgecombe & Sons' carriage factory and property at Fredericton, last week under an execution at the suit of the Bank of British North America for \$15,000. This crisis has arisen from a dispute between the heirs of the late John Edgecombe and not from any insolvency on the part of the concern.

Estey's storehouse with large quantity of potatoes and flour; Lee's opera house and stable; dwelling house of Charles Segee, barns of P. McGinn, T. B. Murphy, building ; J. G. Gunn's dwelling, and J. J. Fox's grocery store; Mrs. Lin. orth's wooden dwelling; dwelling of Mr. Haining; C. A. Parson's hotel and stables. Loss about Temperance

-A Campbellton despatch to the Sun says :- Frank Levesque, the young burglar captured in W. A. Mowat's store last week, was brought before Police Magistrate Mchatchy on Tuesday, when from some cause unexplainable, he was discharged, much to the supprise and indignation of the citizens.
