To the Editor of The Review:

The editorial in the last issue of THE REVIEW on the appointments to the Supreme Court Bench has attracted considerable attention, more particularly because of the prominence that is given to Judge Landry's pretended claims for the anticipated Supreme Court vacancy. From the unanimity with which his personal friends are pressing his name, the support that is apparently being given to it by THE REVIEW and Moniteur Acadian, and the political wire-pulling that is evidently being brought to bear, one would be quite justified in concluding that Judge Landry is himself not only pressing his candidature, but is also justifying the reasons of a denominational and racial character upon which it is based. It is so, it is a most regrettable fact. Nothing, in my opinion, is more calculated to bring the Bench of this country into disrepute and contempt than this continued self-seeking and grasping for higher position, and that, too, not because of special qualifications or ability for the coveted position, but because the applicant belongs to a particular denomination or comes of a particular lineage. What the people look for and have a right to expect in their judges is knowledge of law, ability and integrity. When a lawyer is appointed to the Bench he should be removed from the intrigues of party and the wire-pulling of politicians. His nationality, and religious belief should neither, on the one hand, be a bar to his appointment if these qualifications exist, or, on the other hand, justify it if they are wanting.

Not a voice was raised against Judge Landry's appointment to the County Court Bench because he was an Acadian and a Roman Catholic, and his promotion to the Supreme Court would not now be opposed on any such narrow grounds. But it would appear that having accepted a County Court judgeship and retired from politics he should rest satisfied, and not allow his friends, on every occasion on which a Supreme Court vacancy is anticipated, to press forward his candidature on the grounds upon which particularly they base it.

From what an outsider can learn the members of the legal profession, who should be in a position to form a fair opinion, are not disposed to regard with favor his promotion, but believe he has ample field for his abilities and his legal knowledge on the County Court Bench. It is intimated, I understand, that if he is not promoted on the first Supreme Court vacancy he will resign and again seek to re-enter political life. Well, Mr. Editor, the opinion is entertained by many, with whom I have talked, that Judge Landry has never kept himself wholly aloof from politics, and that on more than one occasion he has sought to impress public men with the belief that he is still "the power behind the throne."

If this is the case, it would probably be better for him to resign at once and again "try his luck" politically. In any event, I am impressed with the belief that Kent will not again open her arms to him. There is no reason why the electors of this county should remember with lively gratitude his representation of it. He sought to advance his own interests and succeeded, while comparatively little attention was paid to the county.

I know, Mr. Editor, that it is generally assumed that judges are and should be removed from public criticism, and it would hesitate to break through this wise rule, but when Judge Landry and his friends publicly press his candidature for such a prominent position upon the grounds and with the influences and covert threats they do, a full discussion of the situation seems to be justified.
