CONGRESS OF RELIGIONS.

One of the most remarkable as well as most important assemblies that has ever taken place in the history of the world was the congress of religions at Chicago recently in which all the religious beliefs were represented. There are many who profess to see in this meeting a move in the direction of unity and liberality in the matter of religious belief and a departure from the strict cast iron dogmas of the different faiths. Never before, they declare, has the cheering evidence of a universal desire for unity of religious sentiment been made so manifest as at the World's Fair congress of religions. Orthodox and Heterodox, Christian and Pagan, the worshippers of the religion of Christ and the Buddhist, the followers of Confucius and the Christ of the new gospel dispensation, the immersing Baptist and the sprinkling Presbyterian, the Trinitarian and the Unitarian, the Protestant and Catholic, the Dogmatic and Free Thinker all occupied one position in that congress with full freedom to give expression to their own individual views. Never before have the various religious sects met on the same terms of equality or been so nearly a universal representation. Never before have prevailing animosities been laid aside and the dogmatism of sect been swallowed up in the universal agreement upon the organic principles of a universal religious creed upon which the whole world could stand. Not that a creed was actually formulated and put on its way to universal adoption, but there was evidence of a willingness to drop strict dogmatic creeds. They believe the congress of religions will be the means of taking the initial steps toward settling many religious antagonisms and bring the devotees of differing creeds into conditions of friendly relations with each other and societies of differing religious views will look on opposing creeds with more charity than has been the order in the past. There are others, again, who believe the Congress was a mistake and that the effect will be to lead many into open skepticism. They appear to think the bounds of liberality were overstepped when Professor Mohammed Webb was allowed to address the assembly on the subject of Islamism and advocate a doctrine in direct conflict with the most sacred tenets of Christianity. A distinguished Boston divine who attended the congress says that too much attention was devoted to heathen subjects to the exclusion of Christianity and gives it as his opinion that the meeting did incalculable mischief.

THE ELLIS CONTEMPT CASE.

A final decision has been reached by the Supreme Court of this province in the Ellis Contempt Case. In 1887 the St. John Globe edited and controlled by Mr. J. V. Ellis, took occasion to denounce the Queen's County election steal, and in doing so severely criticized the action of Judge Tuck in granting an order prohibiting a recount of the ballots cast. For this article proceedings were instituted and Mr. Ellis was adjudged guilty of contempt of court. An appeal was taken to the Supreme Court of Canada, and dismissed and on Saturday Mr. Ellis was sentenced by the Court to thirty days imprisonment and ordered to pay a fine of \$200 and the costs of the case which will probably be taxed at \$3000. The judges no doubt arrived at the conclusion that the dignity of the court must be upheld, and that this could not be done if newspapers were allowed to criticize the judicial acts of the judges. The people generally, however, will not view the matter in this light. The fraud perpetrated in the Queens County matter, was of so glaring a nature as to call forth strong expressions of disapproval, and the public will be inclined to view with lenience Mr. Ellis' remarks even though Judge Tuck did come in for some unjust criticism. Mr. Ellis is a gentleman who has many warm political and personal friends and while the sentence imposed may tend to still all future criticism of the judicial acts of the court or its judges, it certainly will not degrade Mr. Ellis in the eyes of his friends, or lessen the esteem in which he is held in the city of St. John and throughout the province generally.

Mr. George Robertson, President of the St. John Board of Trade, in a newspaper interview in Montreal, declared that if more pains were not taken to turn western trade to the maritime province ports, "the time would come when the provinces would demand separation from the Dominion of Canada."

The financial statements up to Oct. 1 are published in Saturday's "Official Gazette." The net public debt was \$239,449,000, a decrease of \$808,812. The revenue for the three months was \$9,135,000, expenditure, \$5,640,000. Each time an interim statement like this is published Government organs talk in black letter enthusiasm of a surplus of millions and add that it indicates prosperity in the country. The chief revenue comes from customs duties on imports and the last statement showed that although imports fell off by millions the taxes collected from the people by the Customs increased.

Although the majority of the owners of collieries in Derbyshire who adhere to the federation of coal owners are posting notices in accordance with the terms of the resolution adopted on Tuesday at the conference in Sheffield, several have reopened their pits and the miners have gone back to work at the old rate of wages. Nine thousand men resumed work in Derbyshire. Fully 20,000 miners are now at work in Nottinghamshire and Warwickshire, and it may be said the situation in the coal districts there has virtually assumed its normal condition. Defections among themselves have seriously weakened the coal mine owners' association. The miners are jubilant and claim to have practically won the fight.
