



-The Vigilent defeated the Valkyrie for the third time, Friday, thus winning the series and retaining the cup on this side of the water.



A RETURNED EXODIAN -Mr. S. C. Weeks returned Thursday from Boston, where he went some time ago, intending to make it his home. HARBOR SURVEY .- Mr. Lefleur, Government Surveyor, arrived last week and on Monday began an inspection of the Richibucto Harbor, with a view to steps being taken towards its improvement. He engaged the steam yacht Calluna, and after visiting the breakwater and beaches arrived at the conclusion that a more successful survey could be made when the ice forms He will return this fall to complete the survey.

SUPREME COURT .- The case of West vs. O'Leary came up for argument before the Supreme Court at Fredericton, last week. This was an appeal from the Kent County Court. The plaintiffs, several years ago, sold a safe to John D. McMinn, taking several lien notes in payment. McMinn sold the safe to O'Leary. The plaintiffs claimed that one of the notes was unpaid, and brought action for the safe. Defendant contended that he had bought the safe in ignorance of the claim of plaintiffs, and contended that the plaintiffs had by printing McMinn's name on the safe estopped themselves from now claiming it. The jury found a verdict for defendant, and plaintiffs appealed. J. D. Phinney for plaintiffs ; Geo. F. Gregory for defendant. Court considers.




