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The Behring Sea. Article six of the treaty between Great Britain and the United States, by virtue of which the arbitration took place, called for certain specific answers upon five points. The following are the answers or declarations, the first four of which were agreed to by all of the arbitrators except Mr. Morton, one of the United States representatives; Mr. Harlan, the other American member, agreeing to them:—

As to the first of said five points, we decide as follows:—By the ukase of 1821 Russia claimed jurisdiction in the sea now known as Behring Sea to the extent of 100 Italian miles from the coasts and islands belonging to her, but in the course of the negotiations which led to the conclusion of the treaty of 1824 with the United States and the treaty of 1825 with Great Britain Russia admitted that her jurisdiction in said sea should be restricted so as to reach a canon shot from shore. It appears that, from that time up to the time of the cession of Alaska to the United States, Russia never asserted in fact or exercised any exclusive jurisdiction in Behring Sea or any exclusive rights to the seal fisheries therein beyond the ordinary limit of territorial waters.

As to the second of the five points, we decide and determine that Great Britain did not recognize or concede any claim upon the part of Russia to exclusive jurisdiction as to the seal fisheries in Behring Sea outside the ordinary territorial waters. As to the third point, as to so much thereof as requires us to decide whether the body of water now known as Behring Sea was included in the phrase "Pacific Ocean" as used in the treaty of 1825 between Great Britain and Russia, we unanimously decide to determine that the body of water now known as Behring Sea was included in the phrase "Pacific Ocean" as used in said treaty.

On the fourth point we decide and determine that all the rights of Russia to jurisdiction and to the seal fisheries passed to the United States limited by the cession. On the fifth point the decision was that the United States has no rights to the protection of or property in the seals frequenting the islands of the United States in Behring Sea when the same are found outside the ordinary three-mile limit.

From this decision both Mr. Harlan and Senator Morgan dissented. By it however, it becomes necessary to make arrangements for the proper protection and preservation of the seals, and the arrangements made are embodied in the following, to which only four of the arbitrators agreed, the dissentients being Sir John Thompson and Messrs. Harlan and Morton. Lord Hannen, the English colleague of Sir John Thompson, did agree to them:—

Article 1. The United States and Great Britain shall forbid their citizens and subjects, respectively, to kill, capture or pursue at any time or in any manner whatever the animals called fur seals within a zone of sixty miles around the Pribilof Islands, inclusive of the territorial waters

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Oats Turned Into Rye. Deacon Vanwart, of Wickham, Queens County, was in town yesterday. In conversation with a Sun reporter Mr. Vanwart said the good people of that place had been treated to a genuine surprise. Some time ago Dr. M. H. McDonald read in an American book of agriculture that if the tops of green oats were cut off several times during the season a head of rye would appear in place of an oat head. Last April the doctor planted a handful of good oats in a small box. When they got up several inches he cut an inch or two off the tops. This operation was repeated several times up to July when the oats were allowed to take their course. A week or so ago the doctor was himself somewhat surprised to see heads of rye appearing on top of the oat stalks. Several prominent farmers in that locality have examined this curious freak of nature and agree that they never saw anything like it.
