ACCIDENT .- At Harcourt, on Wednesday of last week, as Mrs. Benjamin Mc-Leod and Mrs. David Johnson were driving down the hill near Ephraim Wheten's a bolt of the shaft got unloosened. The horse became unmanageable and the occupants were thrown to the ground. Mrs. McLeod had bones in her left arm broken while Mrs. Johnson was quite badly bruised about the face.

BOAT RACING .- The water has been very rough outside the bar this week, and it has been impossible for fishing boats to get to their nets. The men amused themselves boat racing inside the harbor, and there is much controversy as to who owns the fastest boat. On Saturday, five boats entered to sail for a purse of ten dollars. The race was close, the Wellington, owned by Thomas Thompson, coming in ahead with James Graham's boat, the I. X. L., about a length behind.

Excursion .- On Wednesday, of last week Mr. John Ferguson, of Newcastle, who was spending a few days in Richibucto, engaged the steam yacht "Calluna" and with a party of friends went down the river with the intention of spending a few hours on the beaches. A strong wind and heavy sea made it difficult to land there, however, and the party proceeded about ten miles up the river, where they selected a convenient landing place and spent a very pleasant afternoon.

INSURANCE RATES.—It is said the tariff fire insurance companies have decided to increase the rate on buildings in unprotected towns and villages to four per cent. Fall Dress
This increase will effect the towns of Kingston, Buctouche and Harcourt in this county, and should induce the citizens of these places to take steps to provide fire protection. The cost of an engine and equipments would be more than met by the reduction in insurance rates. The refusal of the companies to take risks in Buctouche, has compelled the citizens to act in the matter, and it is understood negotiations have been about completed for the purchase of an engine, and appliances from parties in Truro.

A NARROW ESCAPE.-Mr. Wn. Long, pilot, had a very narrow escape from drowning, Saturday morning. After securing one of the vessels that had just arrived, he proceeded to sound the bar to ascertain the depth of water. A heavy sea breaking over the bar, overturned his boat and he was thrown into the water. He was unable to swim, but managed to cling to the bottom of the boat for some time. John Curwin and bis son, who were returning from one of the vessels lying outside, saw his dangerous position and hastened to his assistance at the risk of their lives. They reached the place just as a huge breaker tore him away from his boat. They managed, however, with some difficulty to get hold of him and draw him into the boat. His own boat sank, and has not been seen since.

METHODIST DISTRICT MEETING .- The financial district meeting of the Miramichi district of the Methodist church was held in the Methodist church, of this town, on Tuesday last, opening at 9 a. m. There were present Revs. L. S. Johnson, of Newcastle, chairman; G. Steel, financial secretary, of Chatham; H. Penna, of Derby; J. W. McConnell, A. B., of Harcourt; J. Seller, A. M., of Bathurst, and N. Mc-Laughlin, of Buctouche. The usual financial business was attended to in the forenoon. In the afternoon arrangements were made for holding missionary, educational and sustentation fund meetings. In the evening a district Sunday school convention was held in which the chairman, secretary and the brethren Penna and McConnell took part. Rev. J. Seller also delivered an address.

THE STORM .- The storm of Monday night did not last long, but it was the severest that has been experienced here for some years. It began at about four o'clock in the afternoon, and by midnight the wind had increased to a perfect gale, and the rain fell in torrents. On Tuesday morning the wharves and banks of the river were strewn with fishing boats, pieces of lumber, and broken rafts. The barque Sagona, lying at the public whari discharging a cargo of salt, was torn from her moorings and grounded on the south bank 20c. of the channel, where she now lies in about four feet of water at low tide. It is thought that when the remainder of her cargo is taken out of her she can be towed off. D. English's fishing schooner was washed up behind Mrs. Harnett's house, and now lies there high and dry. Her bowthe side of the side of the hand broken off The fishing schooner Deering, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was driven ashore on the south beach and broken in two. A Miramichi schooner loaded with lumber was driven on the north beach, where she now lies. Several boats and scows were washed ashore and broken up, or badly damaged. The tide swept over the wharves and loosened and carried away timbers, and swept off every-thing moveable. Trees, fences and telegraph wires were broken and blown down, et and several windows blown in and the lass shattered. Standing crops were levelled, and much damage done to fruit other wrecks along the coast. So far as

is known no lives were lost.

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
