To the Teachers.
As pedagogues we may be young. As germinators of the young idea we may be inexperienced. But there is no reason why we cannot favorably compete with any of our brother teachers. True it is that those of several year's standing have had a greater length of time in which to exercise their several abilities, but we being of recent date have possibly acquired a better acquaintance with the improved methods of teaching.

This more especially to the Senior Class of '93 of which I am proud to claim membership. In embarking upon our new enterprise, many of us have not realized our most sanguine expectations. We have not mounted to the topmost round of the ladder in the first attempt. But who can say what our successes will be. We may yet "mount up as eagles," though doubtless it will be necessary "to walk and not be carried." Yes, I for one hope, ere time shall dim my determinations, to have emerged from the lagoon which marks the stand of the freshman schoolmasters. Whether I shall arise will be determined partly by good fortune but in a vastly more important degree by my successes in my humble, peaceful and blessed vocation. Then let us not be dilatory, dreamy or stupefied, but awake from this torpor of imbecility, open our minds, yea our entire being to the most careful consideration and execution of our daily plans.

Our's is a "noble profession," a calling high and holy, grand and important even as the ruling of nations. For, of the children of to-day is formed the nation of to-morrow. As C. H. Acheson, one of N. B.'s most prominent poets (himself a teacher) has elaborated on the same thought.

"Thine is a noble calling, friend of man,
Though veiled by that soft haze of obscurity,
Thou in the march of progress lead'st the van,
Thou usher'st in the world that is to be—
A world of men; almost from infancy,
Thou lead'st them up the rocky path of right
To meet the coming age,—their legacy,
And mutely as the great electric light,
Unseen thyself, the force, mak'st noonday
from their night,
Thou art the nations life guards: to the van
Fair Canada her proud battalion sends
To build her future on the coming man
In whose broad views, truth with ambition blends."

Even though our task is hard, our path beset with many an awkward bramble, our footing often of a dubious nature, yet we should never lose sight of the fact that our faithful and earnest endeavour can be none other than the outcome of good, even in after ages a lasting benefit to the human race. With Henry Wadsworth Longfellow:—

"Let us then be up and doing,
With a heart for any fate
Still achieving, still pursuing,
Learn to labour and to wait."

And since belongs to us the work of enabling and uplifting mankind, the advancement of nations, and the progress of civilization, we can truly say with the poet, (with but a slight modification):—
"In the world's broad field of battle,
In the bivouac of life,
We are not dumb driven cattle,
We are heroes in the fight."

What a grand and inspiring thought, we poor friendless schoolmasters, far from our homes in the remotest parts of the province, some in desert and secluded spots, and the wilderness land of Canada, occupy in our obscure labours, such a high and honorable position. Let us then, members of that fraternity of teachers, followers of an noble idea, never be idle or backward always alert, manfully endeavouring "to open to light all the recesses of ignorance, and tear up by the roots all the weeds of vice." Again in the language of Acheson:—

"Toil! Teacher in thy holy calling, toil!
Thou'rt pollen to the flowers of peace and song,
Toil! Till ye soothe the maddening turmoil
Of men, till ye shall see, and that ere long,
The tide of right roll round this world of wrong"

Having devoted our ceaseless and untiring energies to the welfare of the youthful generation entrusted to our care, we must patiently bide the time, when we shall reap the result of our labors. For as Lord Brougham intimates, we must in the end come off conquerors, having achieved a brilliant success, and gained laurels imperishable. And though we may receive no rich reward from the hand of those whom we may have helped, they

will at least remember us as "one in whom mankind lost a friend and no man got rid of an enemy."
"Then sink to rest, return the world thy room,
And though men raise no lettered marble strong,
O'er these God's flowers shall burst in smiling bloom,
Fit monuments to mark a prophet's tomb."
