THE "TRANSCRIPT" AND THAT KENT COUNTY RESOLUTION.

The Moncton "Transcript," that ardent Liberal supporter of the Blair Grit Tory Government and its direct taxation policy, has been very much worried over the resolution unanimously adopted at the June session of the Kent County Council condemning the persistent unloading upon the municipality by the government of burdens hitherto borne by the province. The Transcript started out in its own peculiar style, in the first place to destroy the effect of the resolution by speaking of the Kent County councillors as an ignorant body of men who did not know what they were talking about. Then it condescended to discuss the question at issue and gravely assured the councillors and the rate-payers that even though the municipal charges were being largely increased for the preservation of the public wealth, the registration of births, deaths and marriages, the support of pauper lunatics, the maintenance of the Reformatory, and other so-called progressive legislation, yet it was all done for their benefit under the patriarchal administration of Mr. Blair who has declared "If the people want these modern improvements in legislation then they must expect to pay for them," that in fact the increased taxes are really blessings in disguise. Notwithstanding its remarkable efforts in this respect, our valiant contemporary has apparently continued to worry over that resolution, and after the lapse of five months has again returned to the subject. It now endeavours to break the effect of the resolution by publishing a letter purporting to be written and signed by Councillor J. V. Leger of Wellington, in which that gentleman is made to say, amongst other things, that he did not second Councillor McKee's resolution. Mr. Leger has waited a long time to arrive at this conclusion and make such a declaration, and it is just possible that his memory may not have played him false on this point, but the fact remains that he approved of the resolution by his vote, and allowed it to pass unanimously without expressing a word of dissent, and he undoubtedly approved of the statements contained in it, as in his letter to the Transcript he now says "I did not then and neither now do I favor any burdens on our municipalities, but I want to wait until an election comes to support or oppose Mr. Blair's so called unjust burdens." Strange reasoning! We would suppose that Mr. Leger would have a duty to discharge as a councillor as well as an elector. We leave the settlement of the difficulty to Mr. Leger and his friends. The electors of the different parishes have again returned to the board a majority of the gentlemen who supported the resolution. Councillors Richard of Saint Louis, and Murphy of Weldford, who were very pronounced in the expression of their approval of the resolution, being elected by acclamation. The important question, however, is—Does not the resolution correctly state the facts? We again invite the attention of the Transcript to the discussion of this point, and since its interest in the subject is revived, it might also inform its readers why it is that the York County Council and the St. John County Council—one of which enjoyed for years the light of Mr. Blair's countenance, and the other now basks in it, have adopted resolutions of a similar character, condemnatory of Mr. Blair's vicious legislation.

DEATH OF GOVERNOR BOYD.

The Honorable John Boyd, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, died suddenly at his residence in the city of St. John, Sunday morning. His Honor had been in the best of health for some time and on Thursday last attended the dinner of the St. Andrew's Society and appeared in high spirits. He attended church Sunday morning, ate a hearty dinner and conversed with his family in the afternoon apparently in the best of health. It was about five o'clock in the afternoon when he first complained of a pain in the region of his stomach. It was not thought serious however, and at eleven o'clock he appeared much better. About midnight the pain became very acute, and at half past twelve he was dead. The attending physicians were unable to assign any cause for his death, except that it might be due either to apoplexy or the rupture of a blood vessel. Deceased was appointed Lieutenant Governor less than two months ago, and the news of his sudden death has given the public a shock. He is the second Lieutenant Governor of this province since Confederation, who died in office. The

first was Hon. E. B. Chandler who died in 1880, after having been governor for less than two years. Governor Boyd was sixty-seven years of age and has been in public life in this province for the past thirty-five years. The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon, and will probably be taken charge of by the provincial government.

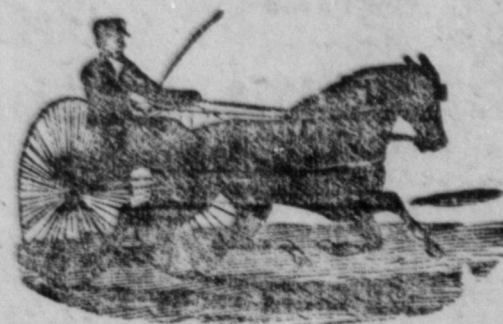

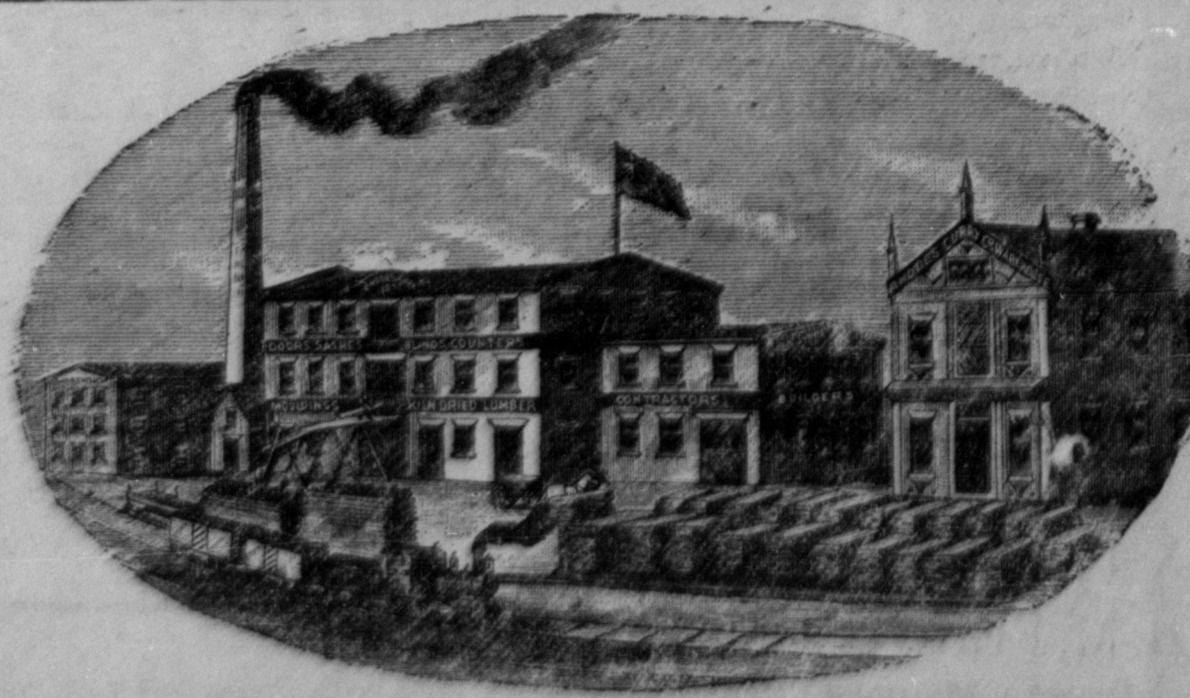
