About midnight the pain became very acute, and at half past twelve he was dead. The attending physicians were unable to assign any cause for his death, except that it might be due either to apoplexy or the rupture of a blood vessel. Deceased was appointed Lieutenant Governor less than two months ago and the news of his sudden death has given the public a shock.
